FLOODS IN TEXAS AND LOUISIANA

LAKE CHARLES, LA., ORANGE AND BROWNSVILLE, TEX., SUFFER.

The Crop Damage Is Enormous—Devastation to the Rice Crop is Very Great.

Floods in Southeast Texas, Southwest Louisiana and in the lower Rio Grande Valley will cause hundreds of thousands of dollars loss on farms, with considerable property damage, as the result of swollen waterways following excessive rains during the week last past. No lives are known to have been lost.

Orange, Lake Charles and Brownsville are the principal points of flood attack. At Orange Adams Bayou has flooded a large portion of the town. The bayou bisects the town, separating Orange and West Orange. A number of residences have been vacated and water stands from six to ten inches deep in some of the suburban stores.

Sabine River, the eastern boundary of the town, is rising, but slowly, and is yet several inches below the high mark of last spring. At Lake Charles street cars have been forced out of commission by the disabling of the power plant which furnishes electric lights for the city, and the town is in utter darkness, with the whirl of the rising Calcasieu River resounding in the ears of anxious citizens. Already property damage there is extensive and many persons are homeless.

At Brownsville, where a break in the Rio Grande levee Sunday caused the flooding of part of the city, there was some relief, the break having been closed. However, water still stands over a considerable area of the suburbs. Across the river, in the Mexican town of Matamoros, hundreds were rendered homeless by encroaching flood waters. It is believed the crest of the Rio Grande flood has passed and no further trouble there is feared.

The flood shut off communication between Matamoros and Brownsville, the international bridge having been rendered impassable, and the approaches to the wagon ferry having been flooded.

Damage to the rice crop of Southeast Texas and Southwest Louisiana is enormous; so great that an adequate estimate can not at this time be made. In the Rio Grande Valley little damage to crops was caused by high water. Indeed, the opposite effect obtained. The country has been given an excellent foundation for good yields from the next planting.

Flood waters from the Calcasieu River had so weakened the Southern Pacific trestle and bridge Monday near Lake Charles that traffic was suspended after the crossing of the Oriole in the morning. Hundreds of workmen are striving desperately to hold the two-mile stretch of newly filled in track and the bridge on which a half million dollars has recently been spent. Owing to washouts between Lake Charles and DeQuincy the Kansas City Southern has suspended traffic and the Lake Charles and Northern is running no trains.

About fifty families have been compelled to vacate their homes, so far, but the rise is slow and the damage reduced to a minimum. Reports from the surrounding country tell of flooded conditions everywhere, and enormous damage to crops. Only a small portion of the rice in the Lake Charles section has been thrashed. Thousands of acres had been cut and the rice stacked in the fields and other thousands are unharvested. It is feared that most of this has been irretrievably lost. Many farm buildings have been washed away and much livestock drowned.

Roads Are for the Farmers. Detroit, Mich.—Secretary Houston of the United States department of agriculture, in an address before the American Road Congress Monday, expressed his approval of the efforts of the organization and explained the interest of the federal government with reference to road building. He urged good roads for the farmer in preference to great trans-continental highways for automobiles and at the same time he said he did not underestimate the valuable service rendered by automobilists in the propaganda for road building.

Albanians Take Jakova. Vienna.—According to reports received at Vienna Monday, the Albanians captured Jakova only after heavy fighting. Prizrend, a few miles to the south, is surrounded by Albanians and its fall is hourly expected. The Serbian garrison there consists of 6,000 men. News from Avlona, on the Adriatic Sea, states that the Albanians have captured Ochrida after a fierce engagement.

Meningitis Not Looked for in Texas. Austin, Tex.—Dr. Ralph Steiner, state health officer, does not look for a recurrence of meningitis in Texas this winter, except in sporadic form. He says the history of the disease elsewhere as applied to Texas would show that it has about run its course in this state.

Former Congressman Lacey Dead. Oskaloosa, Iowa.—John L. Lacey, former congressman, fell dead at the doorway of his home Monday from apoplexy.

Waterways Meeting Postponed. St. Louis, Mo.—G. B. Logan, secretary of the Lakes-to-the-Gulf Deep Waterway Convention, announced Monday that the convention to be held in Peoria has been postponed from the week of Oct. 12 until the middle of January.

Timothy L. Woodruff Stricken. New York.—Timothy L. Woodruff, former lieutenant governor of New York, was stricken Monday in Cooper Union as he concluded an address at the fusion notification meeting.

Lot's Question

By REV. PARLEY E. ZARTMANN, D.D., Secretary of Extension Department Moody Bible Institute, Chicago.

TEXT—Is it not a little one?—Genesis 12:30.



Though Lot lived in the dawn of human history and in a far-away land, he is a modern character and seems like a citizen of our own community, so frequently do we meet men of similar character and conduct. He esteemed silver of more value than a soul, and the variety and excitement of life in Sodom to dwelling in peace and quiet in the tents with Abraham. He is an illustration of the swift descent of the soul into the vortex of sin. He got into Sodom, which was not evil necessarily, but then Sodom got into him, and that is evil always. We know from the record that it was a wicked town, full of sin and abomination, so wicked that even the pleading of righteous Abraham, the friend of God, could not save it; though Lot was saved, yet so as by fire.

Lot's question was asked as he was being led out of the city by the messenger from God. It was a crisis day. The men plead with Lot to bring his family out with him; to his sons-in-law he seemed as one that mocked, so useless was his testimony. The angels constrained Lot to flee with his wife and two daughters. "But he lingered; and the men laid hold upon his hand, and upon the hand of his wife, and upon the hand of his two daughters. Jehovah being merciful unto him; and they brought him forth, and set him without the city."

Escape to the mountains, lest thou be consumed." But Lot does not want to go all the way in obedience, and as he comes to Zoar he says, "Behold now, this city is near to thee unto. Is it not a little one? Oh let me escape thither."

How often have we asked Lot's question about our life, when God has given some clear command. Something is under sentence, we know it, but we think it unimportant. Is it not a little one? For example: lack of love, irritability, worldliness, a sharp tongue, falsehood, uncleanness, grieving the Holy Spirit, lack of forgiveness or apology, unconcern about our own souls. You excuse these; you palliate them; you laugh at them; you have them yourself, and encourage those who do them. You say, "Is it not a little one?" And many of your fellow-men are as unconcerned and indifferent as you are.

But God—let me pause to think of him—calls these things sin. He says these things are fit for destruction and this warning to you has been timely, ample and urgent. You make light of sin, but God's just judgment outweighs your selfish opinion prompted by carnal desires. No sin is small in his sight, and he knows the full measure and meaning of it. This little one may be the seed of a vast and vicious brood. Beware of any sin. Fear it, hate it, flee from it. Say "No" to sin. Burn the witches which seek your destruction. More—it is an awful thing to have any known sin and be determined to keep it.

You ask about your pet sin, as Lot did about Zoar. Yes, God did spare the city, but he does not spare sin. He knows what it is and what it means, toward God and toward men. He knows what it does—robs of peace, shuts the soul out from God, makes towards and makes tools for Satan, brings helplessness, hopelessness and death. He knows what sin costs—Christ and Calvary, for Christ manifested to take away sin; is he doing it in you? Can you face these facts and then stand up and say, "Is it not a little one?" You may make a mock of sin now, but what will you say in that day when the Judge will be on the throne?

And we know how little influence, power and happiness people have who cling to their sins and who refuse to obey the command of God to escape to the mountain. This weakness of testimony appears in the home, in the church, and in the community. The world has no use for a sinful member of the church. It finds fault, it cries shame, and it stays away from the church, from Christ and from heaven. Are you responsible for any such? Do you meet complaint, criticism or censure with "Is it not a little one?" God pity you!

These things ought not so to be. They need not be so. "Ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus." Grace enough for all, and free. Grace for salvation, for keeping, for perfection in the presence of Jesus at the last. "By grace are ye saved."

Do you not see how great and grievous a thing sin is? Do you not want to come into right relations with God? I declare emancipation from that sin, by Jesus Christ, who is able to save unto the uttermost. Don't stay in slavery, but come out into the large place provided by Jesus Christ.

Building Ships on Mountains. Boat building on a mountain top sounds peculiar, to say the least, but such is being done in Switzerland, says the American Machinist. Sulzer Bros. have under construction at Winterthur a 200-foot passenger boat for Lake Geneva. It will be fitted with Diesel engines of 1,400 horsepower. Escher Wyss & Co. at Zurich, are building a 200-foot tugboat for the River Rhone in southern France.

In both cases the vessels after erection at the works must be disassembled and shipped in a knocked-down condition to the place of launching, there to be reassembled. The turbine-building firm of Escher Wyss & Co., Zurich, Switzerland, has under way the largest Pelton water-wheel ever built. It is for Rio de Janeiro, in Brazil, and will develop 19,000 horsepower. The head is 280 m. (920 feet) and the speed 375 revolutions per minute. This firm has installed Pelton wheels in Italy to operate under a head of 1,000 m. (3,280 feet).
