SHIP BURNS IN MID-OCEAN

STEAMER VOLTURNO CATCHES FIRE IN MID-OCEAN AND 135 LIVES WERE LOST.

THE WIRELESS BRINGS AID

Over Five Hundred Passengers Were Saved—Lifeboats Smashed—Many Jumped Overboard and Were Swept Away.

London.—Not since the Titanic sank has Europe been so thrilled as by a wireless message Saturday telling of the burning of the steamship Volturno in mid-Atlantic with a loss, so far as is at present known, of 135 lives and the rescue of 521.

The Volturno sailed from Rotterdam on Oct. 2 for New York, and according to the official statement she carried 22 first cabin passengers, 533 steerage and a crew numbering 95.

The rescue ships reached the scene of the disaster in plenty of time to save all, but for hours stood by the blazing vessel, impotent, because of the storm, to reach the agonized men, women and children crowding the after part of the ship, which was within a stone's throw.

All night Thursday the lifeboats made a desperate effort to get alongside the Volturno, but the waves beat them back again and again and not until the storm abated at daylight Friday did the rescuers succeed in removing the survivors from the doomed ship.

The Volturno was equipped with boats sufficient, the agents say, for a thousand people, but the boisterous sea or lack of boat drill, or panic among the passengers prevented the successful employment of them. The rescue ships were able to lower lifeboats, but apparently most of the boats launched from the Volturno were smashed or upset and the occupants drowned. Two of the boats, crowded with passengers, are reported to have got away from the ship, but a search for them has proved fruitless and they have practically been given up as lost. The occupants of these boats are included in the death roll.

The steamer Carmania, bound from New York for Liverpool, was seventy-eight miles away when the call for help sounded. Captain Barr ordered full steam in spite of the gale and was the first of the fleet to reach the burning vessel. The Carmania was followed by La Touraine, Minneapolis, Rappahannock, Czar, Narragansett, Devonian, Kroonland, Grosser Kurfurst and Seydlitz at various hours throughout the day. But try as they might, the rescuing vessels could get neither line nor lifeboat to the Volturno, the forward part of which was almost hidden by a dense cloud of smoke when the Carmania arrived.

The burning steamer lay in the trough of the sea, pounding helplessly with her propellers fouled by the boat's tackle. The terrified passengers were huddled together as far as it was possible to get from the flames while throughout the day the officers and crew fought desperately with whatever appliances were at hand to hold the fire in check. But night came and the seas abated only slightly. The circle of steamers kept their searchlights playing and waited patiently within the danger zone for the first moment when they might again launch the lifeboats. The hopelessness of the situation was manifested at 9 o'clock in the evening when a great explosion tore away part of the upper works and flames burst from the engine room. It then became a matter of how long the Volturno would stay above the water.

Meanwhile, several of the terrified passengers, wrapped in life buoys, dropped over into the sea. One of them was taken aboard the Carmania. It may be that others found a haven with others vessels of the fleet, but some undoubtedly were swept away. When day broke the Volturno was still afloat. The gale had moderated and the seas had calmed down. From almost every one of the encircling steamer's lifeboats were sent out and into those the women and children were lowered first. Several trips were necessary before the survivors were moved to a place of safety.

It is pointed out as a remarkable coincidence that the Volturno, about four years ago, made a notable rescue in a great storm in mid-Atlantic of the crew of a French vessel. Captain Harrison, who then commanded the Volturno, was decorated by the French government for his daring act.

Passenger tells of the rescue: "As the fire on the Volturno kept away from the after deck, we kept maneuvering near and sent three boats away which made many trips. At 9 o'clock the last boat alongside carried the captain.


"Nobody was left on board. We had succeeded in taking off eighty-eight passengers and the captain's dog. Our boats were then placed in davits and we proceeded full speed ahead.

FEED-HOPPER FOR CHICKENS

Receptacles Keep Food Clean and yet Readily Accessible to the Fowls at All Times.


(By W. R. CONOVER, New Jersey.) To keep the food clean and yet have it readily accessible to the fowls without constantly taxing oneself to maintain these conditions is often difficult.



Hopper No. 1.


wooden troughs for dry feeding should have an occasional scalding and sun-drying.

Herewith are given some ideas for hoppers which are adaptable for small or large flocks as dry feed receptacles or for wet feed if the trough part is of metal. Any handy man can make them of wood. If of metal, the help of a tinsmith may be needed.

may be raised by means of a cord running through the partition. The chute is nine inches high, and six inches wide at the top, with a hinged cover. The space through which the feed passes from the chute to the trough is three inches high.

trough portion rests upon cleats and is removable. Hopper No. 2 is convenient for the small henhouse. It is a simple box with slanting strips four inches apart fastened to a frame which rests over it. It is supported on brackets. It is 2 1/2 inches high and 12 inches in width.

The biggest hen is not the business hen.

Charring corn is one way of providing charcoal for fowls.

Air slaked lime sprinkled on the floor and on the dropping boards will help to keep the place healthy and the air pure.

About the best remedy for scaly legs, which is the work of parasites, is an application of melted lard and sulphur once a week.

Do not forget that your fowls need green food. If it is impossible to give them a change of yard or runs, see that they get some kind of green food during the daily feed.
