POLITICS IN AUSTRIA

After Much Toil a New Party Is Formed in Dual Empire.

Count Julius Andrássy Has Succeeded in Forming a Formidable Political Group in Hungary Called the Constitutional Party.

Vienna.—After months of toil, Count Julius Andrássy, the able son of a great father, has succeeded in forming a new and formidable political party in Hungary, the so-called Constitutional Party. It starts with a strength of 64 in the Hungarian parliament. There are also political leaders of experience and capacity within its ranks, outside of its illustrious founder. But there are, nevertheless, some peculiar features about this new organization. Political life in Hungary runs in two main currents; represented by the 62ers and the 48ers, so-called.

The first-named base their convictions and their action on the constitutional compromise effected with the emperor (as their king) and with Austria proper in 1867, giving Hungary virtual autonomy and independence save in a few stipulated points. The 48ers, on the other hand, otherwise known as the Kossuthers, remain irreconcilable and demand a republic and complete independence. At present and for many years past the 48ers are in the minority.

Now the platform of Count Andrássy's new party has just been published, and in all but non-essential points it is identical with the declared principles of the party now in power, at whose head stands the Hungarian premier, Count Stephan Tisza, and who is in great favor with the emperor and is doing excellent work for his country.

The new party, it is true, has taken some paragraphs from the radicals, the 48ers, such as a general grant of the franchise and a thorough reform of the election laws, and in this respect Count Stephan Tisza does not go so far. But in the main Andrássy's aims seem to be the same, notably in foreign politics, in tax and educational questions and in the handling of the nationality problems in Hungary, and the chief ambition of Andrássy and his followers appears to be

rather of a personal nature, i. e., the ousting from power of the present government and the winning of such power for themselves. But inasmuch as this new movement practically means a split in the dominant party, it might be quite possible that the radicals, the 48ers, would eventually be the winners in this game and enter parliament with flying colors and in the majority. Count Tisza, however, who is very shrewd and foresees this dilemma, will shortly confer with the emperor on this very point, and try to head off his opponents.

It will be many a day before the bubonic plague—first imported from the Balkan battlefields—will have been completely stamped out in Austria-Hungary, and this despite the excellent sanitary measures taken by the authorities here. As a matter of fact, the plague spreads more and more. In the western half of the empire, in Austria proper, there have so far been only isolated cases reported, as in Vienna and in Marienbad, where by dint of stringent measures further infection appears to have been prevented. But in the other half, in Hungary and its dependencies, these have not been so successful, although there, too, severe precautions are being taken.


There is at present hardly one of Hungary's counties from which new cases of Asiatic cholera are not daily reported. Those nearest the theater of the late war naturally suffer most from the scourge, but even districts close to the Austrian border are not free from it. And the mortality is everywhere large. Among the preventive steps taken by both governments is a strict embargo on all foodstuffs from the diseased neighboring countries of Serbia, Roumania, Montenegro, Bulgaria and Greece. Meanwhile news from the latter shows by no means a diminution of the plague. In Bucharest, for instance 42 per cent. of the 1555 cases so far reported have ended fatally. In Serbia, another direct neighbor to Austria-Hungary, there is an increase in cases, the new ones for the last week numbering alone 1224.

Ice Cream Pays Well. Adelaide, Southern Austria.—During the hearing of a case in the Adelaide local court some interesting facts were learned regarding profits on ice creams. A witness stated that on ten gallons of ice cream he could make \$7 profit. He said that the cost of the ingredients was 13s. 5d., and that the total expense of making with ten gallons of milk at 1s. 8d. a gallon was 30s. 1d. It is said that no other business could give such a return.

The New Birth

By REV. HOWARD W. POPE, Moody Bible Institute, Chicago

TEXT.—Except a man be born again he cannot see the kingdom of God. John 3:3.



Nicodemus was a good man, and an earnest seeker after truth. It was for this reason doubtless that he came to Jesus, by night, in order that he might have an uninterrupted interview. He acknowledges the divinity of Jesus, and though an official teacher of the Bible himself, he humbly takes the place of a disciple. If I mistake not, this was his attitude: "Teacher, I have many rules and precepts by which I govern my life, but when I hear you speak, I feel as if I knew nothing. O, teacher, tell me your rule for holy living! Tell me all you know!"

And the master replied, "Nicodemus, you are trying to save your soul by good works; by fasts, and gifts, and sacrifices. This is not the way. What you need is not new rules, but a new heart; not learning, but life; and life always begins with birth. 'Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God.'"

What the New Birth is Not. It is not an improvement of the old nature. The Bible represents human nature as hopelessly bad, incurably sinful.

It is blind: "And when we shall see him, there is no beauty that we should desire him." (Is. 53:2)

It is wicked: "The heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked." (Jer. 17:9)

It is at enmity with God: "The carnal mind is enmity against God." (Rom. 8:7)

It is dead: "And you hath he quickened who were dead in trespasses and sins." (Eph. 2:1)

This is human nature as God describes it. It is not capable of improvement, and God does not attempt it. "Not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be." (Rom. 8:7)

When a bell has been cracked it gives out a hoarse guttural sound which is very annoying. You may bind it with hoops and bands, but nothing will restore the clear sweet tone. The only remedy is to send it back to the factory, melt it over, and recast the bell.

What is the New Birth? It is the imparting of a new nature which is Jesus Christ. "A new heart will I give you, a new spirit will I put within you."

I have a friend who has six acres of greenhouses. A large part of his business is the culture of roses. He imports the wild stock from Ireland because it is peculiarly hardy. He does not put the wild rose-bushes into the greenhouse just as they are and cultivate them. If he did he would obtain only wild Irish roses which are not worth ten cents a thousand. The first thing he does with the wild stock is to graft it with buds from the choice roses which he wishes to produce. Then he places it in the greenhouse, and uses all the appliances known to modern flower culture, and the result is—those elegant General Jacquet and American Beauty roses which sell for several dollars a hundred.

Man is like the wild rose. He cannot produce the fruit of the spirit because there is no holy spirit in him, until Christ has been accepted. Neither can he forgive his sin, nor resist its power. God's way is to impart unto him a new divine nature which is able to overcome sin, and produce the fruit of righteousness.

How is the New Birth Brought About? By believing God's word. Man was lost by doubting God's word, he is saved by believing it. "Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth and abideth forever." (1 Pet. 1:23)

"Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises, that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature." (2 Pet. 1:4)

The Results of the New Birth. I. An immediate deliverance from the guilt of sin. "There is now no condemnation to them that are in Christ Jesus." (Rom. 8:1)

II. A consciousness of divine sonship. "Because ye are sons, God hath sent forth the spirit of his son into your hearts, crying, Abba, father." (Gal. 4:6)

III. A love for other Christians. "We know that we have passed from death unto life because we love the brethren." (1 John 3:14)

When an egg is laid in the midst of the white fluid floats a little germ of life, which though invisible, yet contains the chick which is to be. So when one is born of God the Christ-life enters and coexists with the self-life. Death, as some one has it is the breaking of the shell when we step out into Paradise, from darkness into light.

Those who are born twice do not die at all, but simply fall asleep. (Job 2:26)


