The president has never yet entered the club house, even for a shower bath. At first, when he started in to use this course, he would cut off and play only half way around, but now he negotiates 18 holes, and his game is gradually improving. Many United States senators play golf at Columbia, notably O'Gorman, Cummins, Hitchcock, Bristow and Townsend.

Chey Chase club, just beyond the border of the capital, is the mecca for all of Washington's prominent folk. Its membership list is bulging with the names of notables from all over the world. It is pre-eminent as a hunt club, and all of the favorite games—tennis, squash, bowling, polo and trap shooting—are features of the entertainment it provides. The president's daughters attend the dances at the club quite frequently.

The Washington Country club is situated farther from town than either of these other two. Five miles from the heart of the city and across the river, it lies off the road leading to Great Falls. A view of the White House may be had from its highest hillocks, and with many natural advantages already provided, it is especially adapted to the needs of a country club. The grounds cover 105 acres and its 18-hole golf course of about 5,000 yards is about as interesting in character as any golf devotee would wish to play over. This club offered to arrange in its house a private dressing room and shower bath for the president, but he declined the offer with the statement that in the summer he would take his shower "right in with the boys."

At the Washington Suburban club, the president is particularly fond of the course. He especially likes the fifth hole, situated in a sandy knoll, because it is so difficult to negotiate. This club is a Hebrew organization

and Mr. Wilson enjoys its privileges because his wishes in regard to extra demonstration at his arrival, are always considered, and he comes and goes there with the simplicity that marks all of his movements.

A country club is of great convenience to any man, for it enables him to enjoy all of the privileges of a great country estate at small cost and without the trouble attendant upon maintaining one. He can hunt over fine property, ride, drive and enjoy the outdoor pleasures and sports of all seasons as freely as those individuals who own vast country seats. From this viewpoint does the president enjoy his membership in the country clubs of the capital and at Princeton or Cornish. They provide the means for indulgence of his favorite form of recreation and exercise. This is a striking example of his general attitude toward all clubs.

Before coming to Washington he

has joined the Cosmos and University clubs. He is also a member of the National Press club, having joined some years back.

The University club, of the capital, is a comparatively young institution, having been founded only about ten years ago. William Howard Taft was its first president. Its object is to unite university men and college graduates for the promotion of science, literature and art. Theodore Roosevelt, Admiral Dewey, William Jennings Bryan, former Secretary of State, George B. Cortelyou, Champ Clark and Charles W. Elliot, formerly of Harvard, are among its prominent members.

The Cosmos club is worthy of interest from another angle. Organized in 1878, it has grown in prestige until it now occupies an enviable place among clubs of similar object. It is one of the few, outside of university organizations, which restrict their membership to men of certain distinction of education.

The building occupied by the Cosmos club has figured prominently in the annals of early American history. Mrs. "Dolly" Madison lived in it from 1837 to 1849, and Gen. George B. McClellan occupied it as his quarters in 1861, after the battle of Bull Run.
