CHARTER OF THE

Erath Planting Co., Ltd.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Vermilion.

Be it known, that on this 2nd day of February, A. D. 1914, before me, Anthony J. Golden, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for the said State and Parish, and in the presence of the witnesses, hereinafter named and constituted, personally appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who severally declared that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State relative to the organization of corporations, they have contracted and agreed and do hereby contract and agree and obligate themselves, as well as all such other persons as shall hereafter become associated with them, to form themselves into and constitute a corporation and body politic in law, for the objects and purposes and under the conditions and stipulations of the articles following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name of said corporation shall be the ERATH PLANTING CO., Limited, and under its said corporate name shall have power and authority to enjoy succession for the full term and period of ninety-nine years from and after the date hereof, unless sooner dissolved according to law, to contract, sue and be sued, to make and use a corporate seal and the same to break and alter at pleasure; to purchase, receive, lease, hold, sell and convey, as well as mortgage and hypothecate, under its corporate name, property, both real and personal; to borrow and lend money and to give and receive security or securities therefor; to name and appoint such managers and directors, officers, agents and overseers and to make and establish, as well as alter and amend at pleasure, such by-laws, rules and regulations for the management of the affairs of said corporation as may be necessary and proper.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of said corporation shall be at Erath, Vermilion Parish, Louisiana, and all citations or other legal process shall be served upon the President of said corporation, or, in the case of his absence, upon the Vice President, or, in the absence of both of these officers, upon the Secretary of the corporation.

ARTICLE III. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are hereby declared and specified to be: To buy, hold, own, sell, lease, reclaim, develop, improve, build upon, irrigate and cultivate lands; to rent lands to tenants and to other persons; to raise, buy and sell such as, horses, cattle and other live stock; and to do any and all such things and acts as may or shall be necessary and proper to carry out said objects and purposes.

ARTICLE IV. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at Ten Thousand, (\$10,000.00) Dollars, divided into or represented by One Hundred Shares of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each, which shall be paid for in cash, property or the equivalent thereof. This corporation shall be and is hereby authorized to transact business when Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars of its capital stock shall have been subscribed and paid for.

ARTICLE V. All of the powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Three (3), Directors, each of whom shall hold in his own name or in the name of the partnership, whereof he is a member, at least Five Shares of Stock. Said Board of Directors shall be elected annually on the first day of February of each year, the first election shall be held in 1915. All such elections shall be by ballot at the office of the corporation under the supervision of three commissioners to be appointed by the Board of Directors, and in the absence of any commissioners the president shall have the power to fill the place by appointment, and all such elections, as well as all meetings of stockholders, except for the purpose of liquidation or dissolution or as otherwise required by law, ten days' notice shall be given by mailing to each stockholder who appears as such on the books of the company, at his last designated address, or at the general delivery at Erath, Louisiana, if he has not designated an address, which said notice shall contain an announcement stating the time and place of the meeting and by publication at least during the ten days next preceding said meeting, in a newspaper published in the Parish of Vermilion, La. Each share-holder shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock standing in his name on the books of the Company, cast in person or by proxy and a majority of the

ARTICLE VI. This act of incorporation may be amended, altered or repealed or corrected, and all amendments, alterations or corrections shall be made by the affirmative vote of a majority of Three-fourths of the capital stock, subscribed and paid for, represented at a general meeting of the stockholders, convened for such purposes after previous notice shall have been given in one or more newspapers published in the Parish of Vermilion, Louisiana, once a week, during the thirty days next preceding such meeting, and by notice mailed at least forty days prior to such meeting to each stockholder who appears as such on the books of the Company, to the post office address designated by him, and in case of failure to designate an address, to the general delivery, may be presented and made in reference to the capital stock of said corporation, which shall be made in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana, on the subject matter of altering the amount of capital stock of corporations, and it may be increased or diminished upon compliance therewith upon the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the stock of the corporation.

No stockholder shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts of said corporation, in any further sum than the unpaid balance due on the shares of stock owned by him, nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null and void, or of exposing any stockholder to any liability, beyond the amount due on his stock.

ARTICLE VIII. As stated under article four hereof, this corporation shall commence business or operation as soon as Five Thousand Dollars, (\$5,000.00), of its capital stock shall have been subscribed and paid for, and, in order that this charter may also serve as the original prescription list, the subscribers hereto have set opposite their names the numbers of shares of stock subscribed for by each of them.
