### Some Southwestern Reflections

How did you enjoy your East Tennessee bred Turkey on Thanksgiving? You probably "bawled out" your green grocer for "robbing" you because he charged you \$2.50 or \$3.00 for it. Did you count among the things to be thankful for the fact that upwards of half a million dollars of good Louisiana money had to be sent to Tennessee to buy what you could have produced at a greater profit than the Tennessee farmers realized on these turkeys.

And then another half million dollars will go to East Tennessee farmers for Christmas turkeys, and perhaps still another half million for New Year's dinners. And still we tell the world we have progressive farmers in Southwest Louisiana. Men, brethren--and sister suffragettes too--how are we going to square these facts with our loud claims?

Two or three years ago Texas farmers mobilized a great army of many thousands of turkeys and the Governor of the State headed the herdsmen who drove them into San Antonio to be prepared for shipment to Western Markets. If enterprising lovers of peace should attack the embattled armies in Northern France and Belgium on Thanksgiving Day with a hundred thousand fat turkey cocks ready for the spit, both armies would capitulate for a day at least.

But if these patriots depended upon Southwest Louisiana to furnish the peace offerings in the shape of fat turkeys, how long would the poor soldiers have to wait for

their Thanksgiving dinner. And yet we can produce turkeys more cheaply than the farmers of Tennessee and Texas are able to do it.

Can't we be farmers in 1915, and produce a half million turkeys for next Thanksgiving Day? The Agricultural College of the Louisiana State University which, by the way, the farmers of Louisiana ought to require to be endowed with at least a million dollars for permanent buildings, equipment and grounds, has just added a scientific poultry man to its staff. He would be a good man for Southwest Louisiana to keep in touch with.

In her citrus fruits Southwest Louisiana possesses another mine of wealth of fabulous possibilities. Louisiana produces oranges the quality and flavor of which excel those of any grown elsewhere in the United States, and Southwest Louisiana can produce them as cheaply as they can be grown in California or Florida.

How many Louisiana Sweets, or Satsumas are you growing? If you haven't an orange orchard remember they may be planted successfully from now until Spring. Get in the game and let's bring Southwest Louisiana and her citrus fruit possibilities to the front and get rich. "Orange Day" last week suggested the "timely remarks."

Don't sacrifice your corn and sweet potatoes. Hold them till January unless a fair price can be obtained; if unable to hold them feed them mixed with a little cotton seed meal or tankage to steers, dairy cows and hogs.


