Southwestern Reflections

Although the weather has been untoward, up to the present there is no occasion for discouragement. In Southwest Louisiana we are blessed with a long growing season and the excessive rainfall may, after all, be the means of protecting us from having early planted crops frost-bitten.

Don't fret about the weather. There are plenty of things the farmer can do in the way of making improvements about his premises, improvements which, if the weather were good, he would never make. Moreover, the weather which keeps the farmer out of the field will give a better opportunity to test his seeds, the imperative duty of doing which was the subject of last week's discussion.

If the weather should have become ideal by the time this article appears, its precepts will not have been lost because they will keep--they are as good for next year as they are for this year, and will be as long as rains interfere with farm labor and farmers have to plant seeds and keep up the farm machinery.

How many farmers are going to plant lespedeza this year? It is the great hay crop of Southwest Louisiana, because it is a highly valuable forage crop and while making the most nutritious hay for cattle and horses is at the same time, silently gathering nitrogen from the air and storing it in the soil. Systematically produced it will save the farmers of Southwest Louisiana alone, millions of dollars, they would otherwise have to pay out for the purchase of cotton seed meal or other fertilizer with heavy nitrogen content.

No farmer in Louisiana is entitled to being called progressive who does not plant some acreage this year in lespedeza. In order to get good work from his teams he must have hay and no hay gives better feeding results than lespedeza which grows wild in many places in Southwest Louisiana.

Likewise meat is going to be high this year. The day seems to be drawing near when dollar-a-pound porter-house steaks will be realized. What is going to be your situation when that condition arrives? Are you going to be the man to pay the dollar-a-pound, or will you have dollar-a-pound steak to sell to the other fellow? Its time to think about this now.

In this matter every farmer must "do" the other fellow, in the sense of producing the steak, or be "done" by him, so you'd better be in the doing class and have dollar steaks for the other fellow to buy. Remember..

"Four times is he armed who gets his blow in Fust"

Therefore, farmers of Southwest Louisiana, raise beef and plenty of pork this year, arrange for silo, plant ensilage crops and let's make a killing this year. Then get into the Bureau's Prosperity Campaign movement and let's all pull for our State this year.


