When Crops should be Harvested for Silage.

Corn is ready to harvest for filling the silo about the same time it is ready for harvesting the fodder; the grains should be well dented and glazed and a few of the lower leaves turned brown. If the corn is cut too green the silage will be sour, and the feeding value decreased while, on the other hand, if the corn is too ripe it will not pack well in the silo, a large amount of water will be necessary to insure its keeping quality, and there is danger of dry rot which lowers the feeding value.

Sorghum should be harvested for the silo while the seed are in the dough stage. Like corn, if it is left in the field until it has become too dry, the silage will contain a large amount of indigestible material, and will not make a good quality of silage.

The time of harvesting the crop for filling the silo that is, the stage in which the crops should be harvested must be given great consideration if a good quality of silage is to be obtained.

Pea vines, soy beans, and other hay crops should be harvested for the silo at the same time as for making hay that is, when in full bloom and few of the heads are ripe.--W. R. Dodson, Director of Experiment Stations, L. S. U.

Community Co-Operation

One of this country's largest bankers made the statement not long ago that "the small-town banker is in position to render his community a most valuable service if he will recognize and take advantage of the opportunity by doing his full part in community welfare work.

His statement elicited an expression from one of our small-town bankers to the effect that a large majority small-town banks really do more to retard community welfare and development than they do to promote them. This is a most lamentable condition even if only partially correct as stated.

Many bankers consider their banks institutions for community service and conducted them accordingly. A splendid example of this class came to my attention a few days ago.

The president of a bank in a small-town, when asked as to his idea concerning a bank's duties

and its obligations to the community, said: "Inasmuch as we are the largest corporation in our town we feel it our duty to take the lead in every movement for the locality. We are the largest subscribers to the local chamber of commerce, civic improvement funds, etc., and never fail to have the bank represented in every local improvement campaign. We also make it a rule to take as much or more advertising space in our local papers than anyone else in the town."

He further stated that "When a small borrower needs from ten to thirty dollars for a short time we charge him the same rate per cent per annum on his loan that that we would if he borrowed \$25,000 or more. We treat the small customer as liberally as the large one, thus making him feel that no advantage is being taken of him because he is poor. He will remember and appreciate this when he becomes a large customer."

Crops for Hogs in Summer and Fall.

The best fattening crop available from the 15th to the 20th of July is corn and cow peas, and sufficient area should be supplied to keep the hogs from four to six weeks. It will generally be found advantageous at the end of that time to transfer them to a field of peanuts or soy beans of sufficient area to maintain the animals about four to six weeks. Feed them a little dry corn to balance the ration. Profitable crop available for hog feed from the latter part of October until the latter part of December is sweet potatoes, and the fattening period can be closed with the harvesting of this crop. When hogs are allowed to harvest sweet potatoes at will and are fed a moderate quantity of slops containing a rich protein feed, they make remarkably rapid gains, W. R. Dodson, Director of Experiment Stations, L. S. U.

Progressist Candidates.

It is understood that the Attorney General, to whom the matter was referred for an opinion has decided that if the Progressist candidates for the Constitutional Convention have otherwise been properly nominated, their names can be printed on the official ballot. Secretary of State Millsaps was inclined to take a different view of the case although he declined to give a ruling, involving, as it does legal propositions and resulting from a defect in the act providing for the convention. It was, as he pointed out, a matter for the Attorney General and his decision has been awaited with interest.

21,000,000 Horses.

Ten years ago when the automobile began to be a general and practical reality, we heard much about the threatened disappearance of the horse. Five years ago when the auto truck first asserted itself broadly, there was more of the same, but what are the facts, ask Veterinary Science. The agricultural department estimates that there are now close 21,000,000 horses in the United State, a greater number than in any other year except 1910. Since 1898 the number of horses on the farms has increased 20 per cent, in the interval which reaches the huge sum of \$2,000,000. has increased over four and one-half times, the value per head has grown from \$34 to about \$110. That there is room on this broad earth for both automobiles and horses these statistics prove.

Many Dipping Vats being Built

Interest in tick eradication continues to grow. Recent reports of parish demonstration agents show that the number of dipping vats is increasing rapidly, which means that the days of the cattle tick are numbered.

In Lafourche parish material has been ordered for eleven vats; in Beauregard parish six vats have recently been completed; in Jefferson Davis parish nine vats have just been finished and it is expected that the total number in the parish will reach forty or fifty before the close of the season; in Calcasieu parish twenty-five dipping vats are in use; in Grant parish the tick eradication movement is gaining headway and several communities are putting in vats; Sabine parish now has dipping vats in every ward; in Ouachita parish \$3,000.00 has recently been appropriated for fighting the cattle tick; Avoyelles parish now has about twenty dipping vats.

The above does not attempt to cover the whole field, but only what has been reported in the past two or three weeks
