minated by said nominating convention on the Progressive ticket for which he declared.

7th-- Be it further resolved, that in case there are two candidates for any Parochial or ward office, the voters shall vote for one or the other to ascertain the choice of the mass meeting for ward officers, the candidates receiving the majority of the votes cast, being the choice of the Party; and in case of Parochial candidates, the one receiving a majority of the votes cast at all the ward mass meetings, shall be the choice for the office for which he declared, and the Parish Nominating Convention shall declare him the nominee for said office.

8th-- Be it further resolved, that in case there are more than two candidates for any Parochial or ward office, in case of ward offices, the ward mass meeting declaring the choice of the Party; while in case of Parochial offices the result of all the ward mass meetings shall be canvassed by this Committee to ascertain the choice of the Party for that particular office and the Parochial Nominating Convention shall nominate accordingly.

9th-- The several mass meetings having voted on all the candidates before them, and elected its delegates as above provided to said Convention shall instruct them to vote for the choice in said convention according to the result ascertained under the above rules, the several mass meetings remaining in continuous session until all votes for all offices shall have been taken and the delegates to the Parish Nominating Convention are elected.

10th-- Be it further resolved, that this Committee shall furnish all ballots to be used at all the ward mass meetings, which ballots shall be of uniform size and of same color, and the names of candidates for each office shall be arranged alphabetically, and the ballots for each office shall be on one and the same ballot including delegates.

11th-- Be it further resolved, that on or before January 25th 1916 at 2 p. m., each candidate shall file with the Chairman, Secretary or Assistant Secretary, of this committee his declaration to become a candidate for any ward or parochial office; which declaration shall be in the following form:

"I do hereby declare myself a duly qualified voter of the ward of Vermilion Parish; that I am in sympathy with the Progressive Party; that I am familiar with the rules prescribed by your Committee for the selection of ward and parochial candidates for the Progressive Party, adopted by your Committee on Jan. 10th, 1916; that I am a candidate for the office of..... and will abide by the result of the mass meeting or mass meetings and hereby pledge my influence and support to have the Parish Nominating Convention nominate all those whom your Committee shall declare to be the choice of the Party for Parochial or Ward offices, obligating myself, if not nominated, to support all the nominees of the Progressive Party against all other candidates.

12th-- Be it further resolved, that each candidate shall deposit with the Chairman of this Committee the following sum: Sheriff and Clerk of Court, \$75.00; Assessor, \$50.00; Coroner, \$25.00; all other Ward officers, including Members of the House of Representatives, \$5.00, and the candidates for ward offices shall submit to the said Chairman, at

the same time, on or before January 25th 1916, the name of one commissioner, and one alternate to act in case the Commissioner shall be absent, which Commissioners representing the opposing candidates, shall be the Commissioners for the balloting of that particular office, and they shall certify the result of the ballot as to the voting over which they preside in writing signed by them, to the Chairman of this Committee. In the case of the Parochial candidates, each candidate shall likewise and at the same time submit the name of one Commissioner and one alternate for each of the ward mass meetings, and the Commissioners or alternates if the Commissioners shall be absent, representing the opposing candidates for any office shall be the Commissioners for the balloting of that particular office and shall likewise make a report to the Chairman of this Committee in writing, signed by them all, of the result in their respective wards.

13th-- Be it further resolved, that this Committee shall meet at 2:00 p. m. January 25, 1916, to eliminate votes who participated in the Democratic Primary Election and to pass on applications to become candidates, and on January 31, 1916, at 2:00 p. m. for the purpose of declaring who have been selected for each of the ward and Parochial offices.

14th-- Be it further resolved, that no declaration to become a candidate shall be received by the Chairman of this Committee later than January 25th 1916, at 2:00 p. m. nor shall he receive any declaration unless accompanied by the deposit herein provided and the names of Commissioners and Alternates; and this Committee shall meet on that day and hour to consider said declarations.

15th-- Be it further resolved, that the balloting in all cases shall be secretly but if any voter desires assistance in making his ballot, he shall so state to the Commissioners then holding and in charge of the balloting, and his ballot shall be marked by one of the Commissioners in the presence of all the other Commissioners then having charge for that balloting, and provided, that the blank tickets for delegates, shall be filled by the commissioners, in case of inability of voter

16th-- Be it further resolved, that the set of Commissioners representing opposing candidates for each Parochial and ward office, shall procure a satisfactory ballot box for the office over which they preside, and shall keep said ballot box open and shall receive the ballots of qualified voters from 2 p. m. until 7 p. m.

17th-- Be it further resolved, that each ward shall also elect three members of the Executive Committee of the Progressive Party which said members so elected shall compose the Parish Executive Committee for the next four years; that the names of the candidates for member of said Committee shall be written in blank spaces to be prepared for them on the ballot, and filled in by the voter, and in case of inability, these names shall be filled in by the commissioners.

A Makeshift Smokehouse. It is not necessary to build a real "house" to provide smokehouse facilities for home curing. A bottomless barrel may be made to serve that purpose. Dig a little trench into a hillside, making a fire box a foot and 8 or 10 inches deep. Cover this with a piece of sheet iron, leaving a smoke hole at the upper end. Place the bottomless barrel over this smoke hole, chimney fashion, lay a stick across the top of the barrel so as to keep rain out without cutting off the draft, get a little piece of tin or sheet iron to serve as a door to the furnace, and the smokehouse is made.
