# GERMANY'S LAST NOTE IN LUSITANIA CASE

Word "Illegal" Stands Out as Stumbling Block in the Way of a Settlement.

Washington.—The one word "illegal" as differently interpreted in the United States and Germany, protrudes from the tentative draft of the Lusitania agreement perfected by Ambassador von Bernstorff and Secretary Lansing as the stumbling block.

Germany's answer, presented to Secretary Lansing Friday by Count von Bernstorff, proposes instead of an out-and-out admission of illegality of the method of submarine warfare used by the German naval authorities in sinking the liner, an acceptance of liability for the loss of neutral lives, which Berlin hopes will satisfy the United States and still not bind Germany from continuing the submarine campaign.

German officials believe that their previous promise to discontinue sinking unresisting merchantmen without warning brings the submarine campaign within the pale of international law, and that any inclusion of that phrase in the Lusitania agreement is unnecessary and humiliating to the imperial government.

The word "illegal" in the draft the German ambassador transmitted to his government as meeting all the contentions of the United States is taken to have been regarded in Berlin as being susceptible of application not to the Lusitania case alone, but to the entire submarine campaign.

After the ambassador's visit to the state department Friday Secretary Lansing declared "The situation is unchanged."

In the Lusitania note dated June 9, 1915, Secretary Lansing declared that he was contending not only for the mere property rights of the United States, but for "nothing less high and sacred than the rights of humanity."

### Parliament Building Destroyed.

Ottawa.—The historic Canadian parliament building was destroyed Thursday by a fire declared unofficially to have been caused by the explosion of a gas bomb or an infernal machine. Two women, guests of the wife of Speaker Seivigny, were overcome by smoke and perished. Several policemen and firemen were buried under debris when one end of the building collapsed.

The loss can not be estimated in money. The building was valued at about \$7,000,000, but the contents were of inestimable value.

### Onion Shippers Will Be Aided.

Washington.—The marketing bureau of the department of agriculture will give material assistance to the Texas growers of onions in marketing their crop this season, according to information given Representative John N. Garner and Davis McGowan of Laredo, representing the shippers, by the head of the bureau. Based upon planting, the onion crop will be larger than last season. It is the bureau's purpose to keep the shippers supplied with information as to the possibilities of the market throughout the season.

### Great Mine Fire Unchecked.

Lansford, Pa.—The famous mine fire which has been raging now for more than sixty years and which started at Summit Hill, near the spot where Philip Gintor discovered anthracite coal in 1791, has burned through the immense concrete wall which the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company sank in front of it several years ago at a cost of more than a million dollars. It now is threatening the mammoth vein in the Panther Creek valley, the largest and richest vein of anthracite in the world.

### Many Animals Are Killed by Fire.

Tulsa, Okla.—Animals valued at \$20,000 were killed at Sand Springs Saturday when a big dancing pavilion, under which the animals were housed, was destroyed by fire. The Sand Springs zoo was the largest privately owned in the Southwest, and was the property of Charles Page, oil millionaire.

### Great Gas Producer Comes In.

Shreveport, La.—A gas well with a capacity exceeding 20,000,000 cubic feet daily was drilled in Tuesday on the Nelson lease in section 32-13-10, Red River parish. It is the initial completion on that location.

### California Lands Involved.

San Francisco, Cal.—Oil lands in California valued at \$300,000,000 and 220 suits filed or in preparation by the government are involved in Tuesday's decision at Cheyenne.

# PRESIDENT SPEAKS ON PREPAREDNESS PLAN

HE TELLS LISTENERS THAT DANGER LURKS DAILY AND TO PREPARE NOW.

### MENTIONS MEXICAN TROUBLE

President Declares That Army, as at Present Constituted, Is Not Large Enough for Demands of Peace But Navy Is Prepared.

President Wilson returned to Washington Friday convinced, he said, that the people of the Middle West are with him on the issue of national defense and are prepared to insist that congress take speedy action. He finished his speaking tour in St. Louis Thursday and expressed the conviction that his mission had succeeded beyond his greatest hopes.

St. Louis, Mo.—President Wilson declared Thursday in his address at St. Louis that he believed there would never be another war like the present and that the war will hasten the time of a new peace.

The president, beginning his address at the Coliseum, said he had "come seeking something in the Middle West and had found it."

He said he had been told the Middle West was against preparedness, but did not believe it.

"I know the people of the Middle West were just as patriotic as the rest of the nation," he declared.

"I did not come out to learn how you thought, but to tell you what was going on. I came out that there may be absolute clarification of the issues we are now confronting."

"No man can lead America where her people do not desire to be led. I believe it to be my duty to subordinate my individual feelings to the conscientious attempt to interpret and express in the international affairs of the world the genuine spirit of my fellow-citizens."

"So far as America is concerned, no man need go amongst us preaching peace. We are disciples of peace already, and no man need preach that gospel to us."

"America has drawn no fine points, no new issues, in her international relations. She has merely asserted the rights of mankind when the life of mankind is threatened in a world aflame with war. She has rested upon what is already written plain in the documents of international law."

"Now here is the choice we have; here is the alternative:

"Either we shall sit still and wait for the necessity for immediate national defense to come and then call for volunteers, who would be, for the first few months, impotent as against a trained and experienced enemy; or, we shall adopt the ancient American principle that the men of the country shall be ready to take care of their own government."

The crowd roared its approval.

"You have either got to get the men of this nation ready to withstand the first onslaught, or you have got to be ready to suffer from the first disaster."

"The American navy, in my judgment," the president said, "should be incomparably the greatest navy in the world."

Kansas City, Mo.—President Wilson demanded at Kansas City Wednesday that steps be begun during the present month to back him up in defending American lives and commerce abroad. His demand met with shouts and applause from an audience of 16,000 persons who waved American flags, leaped from their seats and cheered.

When the president ceased speaking he leaned forward and asked the great throng to join him in singing "America." The band played softly, the audience stood and the words of America's national anthem came in a glorious burst of song from 16,000 throats.

"Why, some men in Washington are questioning if we could get the 500,000 men for which the government is asking," he said at one point of his address. "Would they volunteer?"

A man in the far end of the hall shouted his answer over the heads of the crowd "Yes," he cried.

A dozen men—a score—fifty—echoed the word and the hall was in a turmoil. President Wilson smiled and held out his hands.

"Why I believe," he said, as the tumult died, "you could raise the 500,000 men in almost any State. I believe you could get 5,000 men right here in this audience."

"I have been thrilled by the experiences of the last few days," the president added, "and I will go home to Washington and smile at the gentlemen who say the United States is not awake."

### Oil Struck Near Santa Anna.

Santa Anna, Tex.—Fred W. Turner and associates have struck oil about three and a half miles southeast of Santa Anna on John T. Pope's farm at a depth of 1,550 feet. The oil was struck under a cap rock about two feet thick.

### Former Congressman Hepburn Dead.

Clarinda, Iowa.—Colonel William P. Hepburn, former member of congress from this district, died Monday after a long illness.
