Our Idea of a Parish Fair

Heretofore the business men have been the leading spirits in the organization of fairs for the farmers of the parish. They have been putting up the money, doing all of the advertising and put up inducements to the farmer to come in and see what has been done for his own welfare. The day ought to have passed when the farmer expects the business men to take the leading part in these things that have to do with the improvement of the rural communities.

In most parishes the annual parish fair is a stable institution and its value as a rural community builder is each year becoming more evident. We hope to have a fair in this parish from the 5th. to 8th. of October that will represent all parts of the parish. To accomplish this end the committee has decided to have a sub-committee in each ward composed of the police juror, Schoolboard Member and three others selected by the first two men to act on a committee in their respective wards for the purpose of getting something from each part of the ward to put on exhibition. Each ward will have a special booth at the parish fair for its exhibit. This will include all Agricultural Products, handwork etc.

The Boys Clubs will have a special place for their exhibits of corn and pigs. The different schools of the parish will have a place reserved for their exhibits of maps, composition writing and etc. To the ward having the best exhibit there will be given a silver cup engraved that will be kept as long as that ward has the best exhibit. To all of the individuals with best exhibits and to the best club members there will be given individual prizes.

After the parish fair is finished we hope to send an exhibit of our best material to the state fair at Shreveport. The committees and farmers and business men of the different wards are to get up their ward exhibit for the parish fair.
