SECRETARY McADOO ASSUMES CONTROL OF RAILROADS.

In pursuance of the proclamation of President Wilson, at midnight of December 31, Secretary McAdoo of the Treasury, as Director General of the Railroads, took possession and assumed control of the railway systems of the country. The Director General has ordered that all the officers, agents, and employees of the systems taken over may continue in the performance of their usual regular duties, reporting to the same officers and remaining on the same terms of employment. The usual reasonable notice is required for severance of employment.

The systems taken over are to be operated as a national system of transportation, the common and national needs to be held paramount to individual, corporate advantage. All the facilities of all the systems are to be fully utilized to carry out the national purpose without regard to ownership. Speed and efficiency are to be promoted by disregarding, when necessary, the designation of routes by shippers and traffic agreements between carriers, and by the establishment of through routes. Existing rate schedules and the outstanding orders of the interstate Commerce Commission are to be observed until changed or annulled. The present methods of accounting prescribed by the Interstate Commerce Commission will be continued.


