Abbeville, La., June 12, 1919.

Gentlemen: We, the undersigned citizens and taxpayers of the Parish of Vermilion, respectfully present the following resolution for your favorable consideration:

That it is the sense of the Police Jury of the Parish of Vermilion to create a Road District comprising the whole of the Parish of Vermilion excepting the Pecan Island and Cheniere Au Tigre Districts, and to order an election to be held soon as same can be legally based upon the assessment and valuation of the year, 1919, for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the Taxpayers and Voters in the matter of levying a 10 Mill Road Tax for a period of 25 years, for constructing and maintaining Hard Surfaced and Dirt Roads with the proviso that each ward is to receive and be entitled to the full amount of money for this road building and maintaining that it's Taxes and sale of Bonds shall yield and that in order to avoid all unnecessary delay—the Police Jury ask of it's Legal Adviser, at once, to prepare all legal documents necessary in the premises.

We, further, ask that you appoint the following 5 citizens of the Parish as supervisors, or commissioners, to the district to be formed:

On a motion made by Mr. Moss, duly seconded by Mr. Frederick, that upon presentation to this body of petition containing 118 number of names requiring by law, of the tax payers of Vermilion Parish, requesting this body to order an election upon the subject of Parish wide good Roads, that this body will order such an election adopted.

On a motion made and duly seconded the Police Jury adjourned.
