

PROCLAMATION BY PARISH SCHOOL BOARD
Arcadia, La., March 27, 1919.
Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Parish Board of School Directors of the Parish of Bienville, La., at a meeting held on the 27th day of March 1919, I, P. F. White, President of said Parish Board of School Directors, hereby give notice that in compliance with said resolution, a special election will be held in Bienville Parish School District on the 17 day of April, 1919 for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers, qualified under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Louisiana, to vote at said election the following proposition, to-wit:
To levy a special tax of five mills on the dollar on all the Property of the Bienville Parish School District subject to state taxation annually for a period of ten years, for the purpose of giving additional aid to said public schools. Mr. Charlie Grigg, who has been serving with A. E. F., has arrived at home and is visiting relatives in this community. His friends are glad to welcome him back.



CHARTER OF THE RINGOLD OIL & GAS CO., INCORPORATED
State of Louisiana, Parish of Bienville.
BE IT KNOWN, That on this day before me the undersigned Notary Public in and for the Parish of Bienville, personally came and appeared the parties whose names are hereunto subscribed who declare that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of this state relative to corporations, they have formed a corporation under the name and style and with the powers and privileges hereinafter stipulated.
ARTICLE I. Name
The name of this corporation shall be the Ringold Oil & Gas Company, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. Objects and Purposes
The objects and purposes for which the corporation is organized is to drill, mine and explore for gas, oil and other minerals, and to develop, store, transport, sell and dispose of same; to buy, sell and lease lands, to acquire hold and dispose of mineral rights and leases; to acquire, construct, maintain and operate pipe lines and refineries; and to conduct a general oil and gas business and to do any and all things necessary and incidental to the objects of this charter.

ARTICLE III. Capital Stock
The capital stock of this corporation shall be fixed at the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) divided into three thousand shares of the par value of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per share; fifty per cent of which capital stock has been subscribed for, and more than fifty per cent of the stock subscribed has been paid for before the publication of these articles of incorporation.
The entire stock of this corporation shall be Common Stock and there shall be no Preferred Stock.

ARTICLE IV. Increase
The capital stock of this corporation may be increased hereafter to Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00).
ARTICLE V. Domicile
The domicile of this corporation shall be in the town of Ringold, La., where all meetings of the stockholders and directors must be held, provided, however, with the written consent of all directors, valid meetings of the directors may be held outside the State or within the State elsewhere than its domicile.
The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted by ten directors, and the names of those selected for the first year, or until their successors are elected and qualified, are as follows: Dr. C. C. Allums, H. R. Wimberly, S. P. Stewart, O. G. Thomas, H. C. Cook, T. H. Mosley, L. B. Cook, J. B. Martin, S. J. Burkhalter and Dr. E. C. Cook, all residents of Ringold, Bienville Parish, Louisiana.

The executive officers of this corporation shall be a President, a Vice-President, and a Secretary-Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by the directors, and the officers for the first year shall be Dr. C. C. Allums, President; H. R. Wimberly, Vice-President; S. P. Stewart, Secretary-Treasurer.
ARTICLE VII. Corporate Powers
The corporate powers of this corporation are hereby vested in its Board of Directors, the said board for the first ensuing year being herein above named, the majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The said board shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of



the stockholders of said corporation, which said meeting shall be held on the first Monday of April of each year beginning with the year 1920, and said board shall have the authority and power to sue and to be sued in the name of said corporation and to appoint such officers and agents and to engage such employees as the business of this corporation may require and to fix their compensation, having due regard to the nature and character of their services, and shall further have the power to make by-laws not inconsistent with any existing laws of this State, fixing and altering the management of its property and regulations and government of its affairs, and the name, certification and registration of its stock, and shall further have power to wind up and dissolve said corporation in the manner prescribed by law, and shall have all other powers as may be named or be permissible under Act 267, of the General Assembly of Louisiana, at its session of 1911.

ARTICLE VIII. Voting Power.
Each share of stock in this corporation shall be entitled to one vote at all meetings of the stockholders to be cast in person or by proxy, provided that all proxies shall be in writing. The stockholders shall be notified in writing ten days prior to said stockholders' meeting by letter addressed to them at their last known postoffice address, or by notice published in any newspaper in the Parish of Bienville at least ten days before said meeting.

ARTICLE IX. Liability
No stockholder in this corporation shall be liable or responsible for the contracts or faults thereof in any further sum than the unpaid balance due on subscription of the capital stock, and no informalities in the organization shall have effect of rendering this Charter null or of exposing the stockholders beyond the amount of their respective subscription to the capital stock.

WAR SAVINGS STAMPS MAY BE EASILY PURCHASED
Dallas, Tex., April 9.—So that purchasing of War Savings and Thrift Stamps may be made as easy a matter as possible, one million blue order postcards are being distributed to the Postmasters in the Eleventh War Savings District by Frank M. Smith, Federal District Director. These are going to every postoffice in Texas and all in Oklahoma, New Mexico and Louisiana which are in the district's boundaries.
Postmasters are requested to send these blue cards out every other Thursday by mail carrier, whether on city or rural routes. The carrier is requested to leave at least one of the order cards at every place where he makes a delivery of mail.
These blue cards are addressed to the Postmaster and it takes no postage to carry them. On the front of the cards are also given facts as to what War Savings Stamps and Thrift Stamps cost and as to how Thrift Stamps may be exchanged for War Savings Stamps.

The reverse side of the blue card consists of a blank by which War Savings Stamps and Thrift Stamps may be ordered. No money is to be sent when the card is returned to the Postmaster, it being stated plainly that the sender is to "Pay no money until Stamps are delivered."
War Savings Stamps and Thrift Stamps can be ordered for any special date or for any day of the week. That is the order can be for one or more War Savings Stamps on March 24, or for one or more War Savings Stamps every Tuesday. Or if Thrift Stamps are desired, they may be ordered in the same manner.

Attention is called to the fact that by buying War Savings Stamps the buyer helps the Government by lending it his savings and invests his savings safely at 4 per cent compound interest at the same time.
