PROCEEDINGS OF THE BIENVILLE PARISH POLICE JURY

Called Meeting of the Police Jury Arcadia, La., March 29, 1919. The Police Jury of Bienville Parish met in called session on this date, with all of the members present, viz: W. D. Goff, R. L. Colon, D. M. White, J. H. Corley, J. B. Loe, T. J. Wood and R. D. Smith. The body was called to order by A. D. Smith, president. The object of the meeting was explained by A. D. Smith, as follows, to-wit: For the purpose of receiving bids for Road Bonds, for Road District No. 7, and W. L. Slayton & Co., submitted the following bids: March 29, 1919. Hon. President and Members of the Police Jury, Bienville Parish, Louisiana, Arcadia, La. Gentlemen: For your \$20,000.00 Road District No. 7 Bonds to be issued by Road District No. 7, of Bienville Parish, Louisiana, to bear date of April 1st, 1917, to mature as specified in your statement copy of which you have furnished us on date of January 24, 1919, to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, both principal and interest being payable at some bank in New York City, N. FARM and STOCK NEWS Taking Care of the Baby Chicks Early hatched chicks are healthier and faster growing than chicks hatched late, according to the poultry specialists, Extension Division, Louisiana State University. They are not so much troubled with lice, mites, red bugs and mosquitoes as are chicks hatched later in the spring or summer. It is best not to feed baby chicks until they are two days old. On the second day after they are hatched they should have sharp, coarse sand or finely crushed stone to pick at, and sour milk to drink. Begin feeding chicks on the morning of the third day, and for the first three or four days give them hard-boiled eggs mixed with four or five parts of bread crumbs. Feed four or five times a day and give them just what they will consume as any surplus soon becomes dirty, sour and unfit for use. After four or five days feed finely cracked corn or five days feed finely cracked corn and commercial chick feed. Scatter this around so the chicks will have to scratch for it. Especial care should be given to feeding chicks during the first few weeks as this is a critical period in their lives. Provide a dry, clean, open-front coop for the little chicks. They should not be let out mornings until the dew has dried off and the ground warmed up. When the chicks are turned out see that they have plenty of shade. Sunflowers make excellent shade and also provide good feed. Summer School Offers Course For Agents A six weeks course in home demonstration work will be given in the Summer School of the Louisiana State University, beginning June 17 and ending July 30. This course will be open to home demonstration agents and to others who desire to become agents. Persons taking this course will be given full college credit. "Students wishing to become eligible for appointment to positions in home demonstration work," says Miss Alice S. Hickman, state agent, "must include in their course the following subjects, which are described in the summer school catalogue: Poultry 1, Gardening 1, and Home Demonstration 2 and 3. A special course in dairying will be offered which will be optional. An advanced course, known as Home Demonstration 2, will be offered for agents who have one year of experience in the work, or who already have had Home Demonstration 1."
