ELEVEN POLICEMAN ARE SHOT CLUBBED OR BADLY BEATEN IN GENERAL FIGHT.

LEADER OF MOB SHOT DEAD

Sixty Arrested in Clash With the Police and Troops When 20,000 Terrorists Attempt a Demonstration.

Cleveland, O.—An unidentified man was killed by a detective's bullet, 11 policemen were shot or badly beaten and about 100 persons were wounded...

Socialist headquarters were totally wrecked by angry citizens, bent on putting an end to the demonstrations. The rioting was general in Public Square and several prominent thoroughfares.

Socialists and sympathizers at the Public Square were ridden down by mounted policemen and soldiers in army trucks sided in dispersing them.

Sixty of the rioters were arrested. A score were found to be armed. Several hundred rioters threatened police headquarters when C. E. Ruthenberg, Socialist candidate for mayor, was arrested...

NOT TO VOTE IN GERMANY

DELEGATES WILL NOT TAKE MATTER TO PEOPLE. Prefers That Treaty Will Be Sufficiently Tolerable to Win Assembly Ratification.

Berlin—Strong currents of opinion inside the cabinet permit assertions that the ministry of Chancellor Scheidemann is fervently hoping to obtain a peace settlement at Versailles sufficiently tolerable to win the national assembly's ratification...

The government's pronouncements in the past months have persistently underscored the nation's need for food and peace. The food situation is slowly being ameliorated, and the government's chief remaining sorrow is its preliminary settlement with former foes.

Scheidemann's party colleagues and the democratic elements in the present administration seem quite conscious that the peace to be offered will hardly be tempered with mercy, yet they are pinning their faith on President Wilson's influence...

Palace For League. Geneva.—A palace for the permanent seat of the League of Nations will be constructed on one of several beautiful sites along Lake Geneva near the city.

Poincare Assures Italy of Fidelity. Paris.—The continued friendship of France for Italy was expressed by President Poincare in a message to the Italian people sent through the association of France and Italy.

Albany Printers Walk Out. Albany, N. Y.—Albany newspapers are tied up with a strike and walk-out of their printers. The printers struck on two papers and resigned their positions as individuals.

Relics in Iceland Museum. The most valuable possession of Reykjavik is its museum, containing relics of northern history. Some of Iceland's historic souvenirs have been taken by Denmark, but the museum contains a number of church relics, old Norse and Icelandic household gods and other exhibits which recall the days of the Red, White and Blue.

MOVE TO PROVIDE HOMES FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

The following comes from the Department of the Interior, Washington, D.C. and is in regard to readjustment relative to the employment of returning soldiers, and is a subject well founded and worthy of every consideration: The forthcoming May issue of the Reclamation Record, published by the U. S. Reclamation Service of the Department of the Interior, contains an article showing the nation-wide interest in and approval of Secretary Lane's plan to provide work and homes in soldier settlements on reclaimed land for our returned soldiers, sailors, and marines. It is stated that already over 35,000 inquiries regarding the plan have been received from these men and that additional inquiries are coming in at the rate of five or six hundred a day. Many of the State legislatures have enacted soldier-settlement legislation in anticipation of similar action by Congress at the coming special session. In many of the States the Governors have appointed special committees to work in cooperation with the Federal Government in connection with soldier-settlement plans. The American Federation of Labor has endorsed the plan in its reconstruction program, and the Daughters of the American Revolution approved the plan by formal resolution at their recent convention. Scores of chambers of commerce, boards of trade, and similar organizations, as well as hundreds of newspapers have placed the stamp of their approval on the plan. The last page of the Record is in the form of a poster, with the caption, "Attention! Soldiers! Sailors! Marines!" which describes the plan and requests every man interested to write to the Department stating his name, age, occupation before enlistment, whether he has had previous experience in farming, what kind of farming he would like to take up, and where he would

be willing to work, whether in his own or in some other State. Individuals receiving this copy of the Record are requested to tear off the back page and post it in a conspicuous place. Secretary Lane hopes, through this and every means, to get in touch with every returned soldier, sailor, or marine who is interested in his plan to provide work and farm homes for them. Secretary Wilson, of the Department of Labor, says: "The present period of readjustment is the critical time. If we can pass through it safely, we have before us from eight to ten years of industrial activity equal to any wave of prosperity we ever have had. But if there is any serious unemployment, there will be a period of industrial unrest which may lead us to a repetition of the French or the Russian revolution." Secretary Lane, of the Department of the Interior, says: "If Congress will appropriate the relatively small sum which I have asked for the construction of soldier-settlements in every State in the Union, I can offer jobs almost immediately to 100,000 of our returned fighting men, thus helping to stem the tide of industrial unrest predicted by Secretary Wilson; provide farm homes for 25,000 of these men, thus mitigating the evils of tenantry; and bring into cultivation 1,500,000 acres of at present unproductive land, thus helping to make up the deficiency in the rate of growth of cultivated land as compared with the rate of growth of our population. There can be no surer insurance for the Nation than to put its men upon the soil."

BIENVILLE PARISH TO HOLD NEGRO NORMAN SCHOOL

Bienville parish is to have a summer normal school for colored teachers desiring to get a legal license to teach, according to Prof. E. H. Fisher parish superintendent of public education. The normal will be held at Coleman's College, Gibsland. The session will start on June 9, and last three weeks. Arrangements will be made for those who wish to attend to get board and lodging at cost prices. J. A. Stewart, of Coleman's College is to be principal of the new normal, and a faculty of five or six more instructors is to be provided. The purpose of the school is to make up the deficit of competent teachers for the colored schools of the state. The Bienville parish normal is to be one of a system of like institutions to be held all over the state this summer, there being 83 of them in all. They are a part of the state-wide campaign for the improvement of the colored schools of Louisiana. Leo M. Favrot, state agent of rural schools for negroes, states in a circular that there is urgent need for at least 1,000 new teachers next fall in the rural colored schools. He says that unless this number is provided, 40,000 negro children will be deprived of a chance to go to school.
