MRS. D. E. BROWN WILL COMPILÉ PARISH WAR RECORD

Bienville Parish is among the forty-four parishes in Louisiana that have been enrolled in the War Service Record canvass, Mrs. D. E. Brown, of Arcadia has been appointed by Gov. R. G. Pleasant as director of the canvass for this parish.

This is a huge task, and Mrs. Brown will require the cooperation of every one who can give her accurate information in regard to the services performed by the soldiers and sailors from Bienville parish, who so valiantly offered their lives as champions of Christian Democracy in the recent bloody conflict in Europe.

The record of the manhood of Bienville parish in the war is a glorious one and it would be a blot on the name of the parish not to support and assist in every way this splendid patriotic movement.

At a cost of \$5,000 the State Council of Defense has ordered all necessary blanks, binders, etc., necessary for recording the record of each soldier's part in the war. When the record is complete a copy will be filed at the courthouse in every parish containing the record of the soldiers from that parish.

Mr. Will Corley, aged 76 years, 4 months and 4 days, one of our the pioneer citizens of the fourth ward died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. F. P. Wimberly, on Sunday, June 15th at 12 o'clock. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Corley, and two sons, Alex and Dick Corley, and three daughters, Mesdames Dollie Wimberly and Laura Stevens of Ringgold, and Mrs. Jessie Lanning of Florida.

Mr. Corley had been in feeble health for some time and his death was no a surprise to his relatives and friends. He and Mrs. Corley have made their home with their son-in-law, Dr. F. P. Wimberly of this place for several years. He was of a genial nature, and loved by friends far and near. He was a Confederate veteran and served throughout the war and was in some of the hardest fought battles. His remains were interred in the Pleasant Grove cemetery Monday afternoon. Rev. Pettus conducted the funeral service.


