

After four months absence at the Peace Conference, President Wilson has come back home, and is being heartily welcomed by the people of the U. S. A., who are sincere in their expressions of high esteem and appreciation for the service he has rendered this nation.

STAFFORD CALLS EXTRA SESSION OF LEGISLATURE

E. M. Stafford, state senator from Orleans parish, president pro tempore of the senate, and candidate for governor, threw the state into a whirl of political excitement when during the absence from the capitol of both Governor Pleasant and Lieutenant Governor Mouton, he attempted to call an extra session of the legislature for August 11, for 30 days, to consider 14 subjects, including Pine Island oil, an unlimited constitutional convention, woman's suffrage and to wrest from Mayor Behrman and the New Orleans organization their political power, by a rigid civil service for all employees of the city of New Orleans.

Stafford was blocked in his preliminaries. He made a run to Baton Rouge Tuesday night and appeared in the secretary of state's office, submitting to him a midnight proclamation calling the extra session. James J. Bailey, secretary, refused to accept the proclamation, saying that he must have proof that Mouton was out of the state. Wednesday, Senator Stafford reappeared in the secretary's office in Baton Rouge and left the proclamation with it, which still refused to promulgate it.—Shreveport Times.

EXTRACTS FROM PROCEEDINGS OF POLICE JURY

ELECTION PROCLAMATION

Arcadia, La., July 7, 1919. In pursuance of and in conformity to an ordinance adopted by the Police Jury of the Parish of Bienville, State of Louisiana, at its regular session held on July 7, 1919, I, A. D. Smith, president of said Police Jury, do hereby give notice that on

SATURDAY, AUGUST 16, 1919 there will be held in and throughout the Parish of Bienville, State of Louisiana, a special election, at which will be submitted to the property taxpayer, qualified to vote thereon the following proposition:

Proposition to authorize the Police Jury of the Parish of Bienville, State of Louisiana, to incur debt and issue bonds therefor, in behalf of the Parish of Bienville, in the sum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) to run thirty (30) years and to bear interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining roads in the Parish of Bienville, title thereto to vest in said parish.


