**EXTRACTS OF THE MINUTES OF
MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN
OF THE TOWN OF AR-
CADIA, LA.**

Be it remembered, That at a call
meeting of the Mayor and Board of
Aldermen of the Town of Arcadia,
Bienville parish, La., held on the 12th
day of July, 1919, at which meeting
the Mayor, B. F. Barthelemy, being ab-
sent, said meeting being presided over
by E. H. Fisher, mayor protem, at
which meeting the following members
were present to-wit:

A. L. Crowson, F. W. Pentecost, J.
S. McConathy and Leo Daniel. At which
meeting alderman A. L. Crowson
offered a certain ordinance and moved
its adoption and thereupon Alder-
man J. S. McConathy seconded the mo-
tion and said motion then and there
being put to a vote of ayes and nays
and the roll being called the vote stood
as follows:

For the ordinance: A. L. Crowson,
F. W. Pentecost, J. S. McConathy and
Leo Daniel.

Against the ordinance: None, which
ordinance is in words and figures as
follows:

Ordinance
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR
AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF
THE TOWN OF ARCADIA, STATE
OF LOUISIANA, That it is the inten-
tion of said Mayor and Board of Al-
dermen at a meeting to be held on
the 5th day of August, 1919, to pro-
vide for the issuance of bonds of the
Town of Arcadia in the sum of twenty
thousand (\$20,000) Dollars, maturing
serially from 1920 to 1929, both in-
clusive, for the purpose of purchas-
ing and constructing an electric light
and waterworks system in and for the
Town of Arcadia, and to fund, see
aside and irrevocably dedicate for the
payment of principal of said bonds and
interest at the rate of five per cent,
per annum, payable semi-annually, the
sum of Twenty-Seven Hundred (\$2700)
Dollars of the proceeds of the general
constitutional tax of Five Mills on the
dollar of each of the years 1919 to
1929, both inclusive; and that this
ordinance be duly published as notice
of the intention of the Mayor and
Board of Aldermen so to proceed.
