BIG HOGS BRING BEST PRICES

Every farmer should try to increase the weight of his hogs. Grov bigger hogs; not too large, but bigger than most of the farmers now grow. The quotations for hogs show that animals weighing 175 to 235 command top prices, and every effort should be made to have pigs put on that much weight at ten months old. One must continually bear in mind the advantages to be derived from early marketing. The gains are made at great expense as a hog grows older; the longer one keeps a hog the longer he has to maintain him or supply him with maintenance feed, that feed which makes no gains. Thus, to minimize the cost of production, we should aim to place on maximum gains at the earliest age possible.

Recent experiments at the Ohio Experiment Station showed that from birth to 100 pounds pigs eat 318 pounds of feed (10 parts corn, 4 parts middlings, 1 part tankage); for each 100 pounds they ate 361 pounds; from 200 to 300 pounds they ate 434 pounds; from 300 to 400 they ate 450; from 400 to 500 they ate 497.

MARINE CORPS CALLS FOR RECRUITS FOR AVIATION SECTION

The Marine Corps Recruiting Station, 617 Common Street, New Orleans, La., Lieutenant D. B. Jones, Jr., officer in charge has issued a call for men for the aviation section of the Marine Corps.

Gas engine mechanics; machine shop mechanics; electricians; wire workers welders and blacksmiths are wanted

for enlistment. These men will be sent through the navy mechanics school at Great Lakes, Ill., where they will receive thorough practical training in all or part of these trades, after which they will be sent to the flying schools for further training.

"This is an excellent opportunity for young men to learn a profitable trade at the expense of the government," states Lieut. Jones. "A majority of men on aviation duty are non-commissioned officers and most of them receive an increase of 50 per cent in addition to their pay. Mechanics who entered the aviation section of the Corps at the beginning of the war with qualifications allowing them to receive in civil life from \$2 to \$3 per day, are now expert mechanics and are obtaining from \$10 to \$12 per day upon discharge. Men enlisted for aviation will not be diverted to other duty."

Lieut. Jones further stated, "That I will be glad to furnish further information about the aviation section to all who write this office, but the local postmaster has been authorized to accept applicants for the Marine Corps and to furnish transportation if they are eligible for enlistment." Men between the ages of 18 and 40

are wanted for general service. All men will have an opportunity to see the world, as the Marines serve on land and at sea. If you want to get in with a "bunch" of fighting men join the Marines.

HAND GRENADE BANKS BEING DISTRIBUTED

Dallas, Texas, July 14.—A limited number of hand grenades, made over into savings banks, are being distributed over the Eleventh District through the various local banks. Boys and girls may obtain these grenades by saving money and buying a War Savings Stamp, and admits may obtain them by purchasing at least three War Savings Stamps. These grenades were manufactured for the use of the American armies in Europe, a big supply being on hand when the war ended.


