RED CROSS SERVING DISCHARGED SOLDIERS IN MANY WAYS.

"Say, Sam, did you ever get that Liberty bond you paid for?"

"No."

"Neither did I. I wonder when Uncle Sam is coming through with it."

This conversation, or one like it, is taking place these days between hundreds of "pals" in the service, or just discharged from it. Various difficulties have been experienced by soldiers in getting the bonds for which they have paid.

To overcome this condition the American Red Cross has come to the rescue. All any soldier who wants his bond needs to do henceforth is to inform a representative of the Red Cross. Practically any contingency causing delay has been guarded against. The soldier must give the representative all the information he can and leave the rest to the association, which will take up the matter and see that prompt delivery is made through registered mail.

The method is this, in brief: The soldier assigns the delivery of his bond to the Red Cross representative, who obtains it from the bond section of the zone finance office and delivers it to the owner.

This is one of the many services of this great organization which is soon to conduct a third roll call to gain money and members to keep up its work permanently.

MOUTON WILL NOT ENTER RACE FOR LIEUT. GOVERNOR

Says He Will Continue to Support the Candidacy of Colonel Stubbs

New Orleans, Oct. 27.—Lieut. Gov. Mouton did not qualify and quit the race for lieutenant governor. This leaves the race for second place to Judge Phillip H. Gilbert, of Napoleonville, and Hewitt Bouanchaud, of New Roads. Senator Mouton wired:

"Lafayette, La., Oct. 27, 1919. 'I shall not qualify for re-election and shall continue to support the candidacy of Colonel Stubbs. I desire to thank my friends for their loyal support. FERNAND MOUTON.'
