28 PERISH IN FIRE AT VILLE PLATTE

28 persons lost their lives in a dance hall fire which occurred near Ville Platte, La., on Saturday night. It is estimated that 300 persons were in the building when the fire was discovered, in a store on the first floor of the building, and the only avenue of escape from the dance hall which was on the second floor was by way of a narrow stairway. In the mad rush to escape from the building, scores were badly burned and injured in other ways, when the stairway collapsed, cutting off the escape of many. The fire is said to have started from the explosion of an oil stove in the store beneath the dance hall.
