"Rotation in office is not always a sound policy. It is not, for instance, in congressional representation if the incumbent is not able, efficient and energetic. When a Senator or Representative has these qualifications length of tenure only serves to increase his usefulness to his constituency.

Before the Civil war, although much inferior in population, the great strength of the South in national affairs lay in the fact that she trained her young men for public careers, as even now they do in England. Whenever a member of either house of Congress proved his worth he was kept at Washington indefinitely, and more often than not re-elected without opposition. That is a policy the South, so often the sufferer from sectional prejudice, would do well to renew now.

A member of either House, even if of only average ability, provided his tenure has lasted long enough to let him form strong friendships and give him the benefit of ripened experience and valuable committee assignments, is a more serviceable representative of his constituency than any new member, even of superior ability, can be.

As a matter of fact nine-tenths of the work of Congress is done in the committee room and only by long service do members gain promotion to the more important committees and the seniority which wins powerful chairmanships when their party comes into power. The age of oratory in Congress is over. The age of business has succeeded it. The new Congressman who has a silver tongue and minor com-

mittee assignments can do little for the people back home.

It follows then an incumbent member, who has unusual ability, who has a record of consistent service to his people, who holds places on influential committees, who stands out among his colleagues at Washington is infinitely to be preferred, from the standpoint of usefulness to his State or district, to any new member." 
