Ringgold has never reared a grander or more noble citizen. From childhood through manhood he was a champion of the right. As so many have expressed it "Elwood Page was always on the right." The poorest and the suffering found in him their staunchest friend. A cripple upon being carried to his casket sobbed: "I feel that I have lost my very best friend." His manly young sons possess a wonderful heritage in having had a father about whom the world can truthfully say, "This was a man."

The funeral services were held at the Baptist church Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, conducted by Rev. J. P. Durham. The casket was brought in by the Masons acting as pall bearers and placed among the many floral offerings. After the services interment took place in the Providence cemetery with Masonic honors. As evidence of the high esteem in which Mr. Page was held in the community was the very large number, both white and black, who gathered at the grave to pay their last respects to his body. He is survived by his wife and two sons, Ronald and Leon, an aged father and mother, and a sister, Mrs. L. C. Graves.
