Fisher spoke of the financial end of the school work and its relation to the school progress. Dr. C. Cottingham president of Louisiana College, gave a strong address on the importance of education. He is a rare speaker and the community was fortunate to secure his services. Prof. Blalock of the Bienville school spoke briefly on the subject of child training. The audience proved to be good listeners as they came to enjoy the day and get inspiration from their fellow citizens.

By one o'clock the long tables were laden with the good things to eat that could be enumerated by the head chef of any city. There is seldom seen the quality and amount as these people had provided. The men realizing that there is more power in action than in words, paid their compliments in silence. Too much praise cannot be heaped upon the heads of the good women of this community who made the feast such an eminent success.

The afternoon was spent in athletic contests, the main feature being the game between the Liberty Hill and Bienville basket ball teams.

This community is to be congratulated on having this complete school plant. It is one of the most attractive in the entire parish. The superintendent of schools deserves much credit for the forward movement and the community is to be congratulated upon the way it has taken hold of the proposition and carried it through to the happy termination.

The principal, assistant and pupils are due much praise for the way they

have worked to make the grounds beautiful. We doubt if there has been done this much work in the parish by any one set of pupils in the way of beautifying the grounds and campus as was done here.

We trust that the spirit that has been manifested here may pervade the whole community and that the boys and girls who are now in school may grow into useful manhood and womanhood.
