GRAVEL TO BE LAID ON DIXIE HIGHWAY.

Most of the section of the Dixie Highway which traverses Bienville parish is in readiness for placing the gravel, and it is reported that the contractors will begin this work within a few days. Certain sections of the highway between Arcadia and Gibsland will have to have additional grading before the gravel can be applied.

It is very probable that grading will be started on the north and south highway leading from Arcadia to Bienville some time during the earlier part of next week. The right of way has been cleared and several miles have been cross sectioned ready for the grading crews.

Grading is also likely to be started next week on the road north of Arcadia which makes connection with Claiborne parish north and south highway. Piles have already been driven for all the bridges and culverts are being put in.

SMITHERMAN ET AL TO START DRILLING SOON.

The location for the first well to be drilled in Bienville parish by Smitherman and associates has been made and a crew of rig builders is expected to start to work Thursday (today) building the derrick. The first well will be drilled on the W. L. White lease about two and half miles southeast of Arcadia, in 29-18-5.

The same thoroughness of detail which has characterized all of the activities of Mr. Smitherman and his associates in the Hayneville area, is manifest in their activities here. Nothing is being done half way, and nothing which can be made sure of is left to chance. In making the first location, surveys are being made as if this were a proven field and other wells to be drilled at specified distances on each 10 acres.

It is understood that all preliminaries in the way of clearing up titles and other legal formalities have been completed and that nothing remains to be done before actual drilling will begin.

Certain interesting data on the previous tests made in this territory which has come into the possession of the Smitherman interests makes the present venture all the more interesting.

MEMORIAL TEMPLE TO WASHINGTON IS BEGUN

Washington, June 15, (Capital News Service).—The first spadeful of earth has been turned on Shooters Hill, just outside of Alexandria, Va., where will be located the beautiful memorial to George Washington, the Mason being erected by the Masonic fraternity of the United States.

Washington, as Master of what is now known as Washington-Alexandria Lodge, F. & A. M., left many relics of the most important historic interest. These, now in the possession of the lodge in the old Virginia city, will be suitably housed in the beautiful fire proof temple to be erected on a commanding elevation between Alexandria and Washington D. C.

The building is to cost two and a half million dollars, and is to commemorate the Masonic activities of the Father of His Country, who carried Masonic teachings into his every official act, and who gave an impetus to the Masonic activities of the United States which is still a guiding force.

The turning of the first earth was done by Louis A. Watres, of Scranton Pa., who is president of the George Washington Masonic Memorial Association. The invocation was made by the Rev. Dr. Martin, chaplain of the association.

It is the plan of the association to erect a building which will be a Mecca for Masons throughout the world and one which will compare favorably in beauty with the Lincoln Memorial recently dedicated in Washington and the house of the Temple, magnificent home of the Supreme Council of the Scottish Rite for the Southern Jurisdiction, which has brought to Washington, D. C., the boast of having the most beautiful fraternal temple in the entire world.

WHO'S TO BLAME?

A few weeks ago there appeared in the daily press of the state a report by State Auditor McFarland mentioning various bond issues sold by the various governing bodies of the state, in which he indicated that the tax payers were made to lose heavily by the bonds having been sold at less than par value. He cited a number of instances of this kind, so many in fact that it appears to have been a general practice throughout the state.

While we have never approved of selling bonds at less than their actual value, we do not feel disposed to criticize the various police juries and school boards and municipal bodies too harshly for these bond sales, due to the fact that in most cases the tax payers themselves have been largely responsible, due to impatience, causing them to urge their representatives on their governing bodies to sell the bonds for what they would bring and begin the improvements for which the bonds were voted. There have been times during the past three years when there was no demand for bonds, especially those bearing only 5 per cent, and the only way to sell them at all was at a heavy discount, because those who could buy would not unless they were made sufficiently attractive.

This was also borne out by the fact that the recent Constitutional Convention passed a law raising the interest rate on bonds from five per cent to six per cent, so that bonds might be more attractive to those who gave the money to invest in such securities.

We have seen no comment in the state press on Mr. McFarland's sensational revelation, and in the light we now see the matter, there is little occasion for such. It appears to be a proposition that is governed by the financial situation at large, and not by any individual or set of individuals.
