Secret of Brasses.

The Japanese are famed not only for their skill in making decorative articles, but for the beauty of the material used. It is said that the secret of the composition of some of their alloys of brass and copper has only lately been revealed. The finest Japanese brass, called "sinchu," consists of ten parts of copper and five of zinc. Another very beautiful alloy, named "Shadko," to which splendid hues are imparted by treatment with acids, is formed by mixing gold and copper, the proportion of gold varying from 1 to 10 per cent of the entire mass.

Experiments in Inbreeding.

In an experiment with 600 white rats belonging to the sixteenth to the twenty-fifth generations of brothers and sisters from the same litter it was found, says Science, that close inbreeding produced no deterioration.
