## One Of Parish's Oldest Citizens Passes Away

In the last issue of the Democrat, a brief account was given of the sudden death of Mr. C. S. Yearwood, one of Bienville parish's oldest and best loved citizens, which sad event occurred at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. N. Conger of this place, last Thursday at noon.

In the passing of this fine old gentleman, the parish has lost one of its most esteemed citizens, his church one of its most devout workers, and there is one less in the rapidly thinning ranks of those who ought for the lost cause.

He was in his ninety-first year, and up until the past few years was unusually active for one of his age.

He was born in Habersham county, Ga., on December 9, 1831, came to Louisiana in 1857; served as a Confederate soldier during the greater part of the civil war, and was in several of the most historical battles, among which was the siege of Vicksburg. On December 25th, 1859, 63 years ago, he married Miss Mary Baker, by whom he is survived. He is also survived by three daughters, Mrs. W. N. Conger, of Arcadia; Mrs. J. M. Brooks, of Grayson, and Mrs. Garrett of Atkins, nad four sons, Drs. Fuller and Garnett Yearwood of Caspiana, George Yearwood of Bayou La Chute, and C. T. Yearwood of Cedar Grove.

Although age had deprived him of his eyesight and his strength, it had not taken from him the polite manner and polish of the typical Southern gentleman, of which he was a true type. He became a member of the Baptist church early in life, and as long as his strength would permit he attended services regularly, nad found much pleasure in religious work.

The funeral services were held in Shreveport at the First Baptist church, Dr. Dodd officiating. Interment was at Forest Park Cemetery. The floral offerings from friends and relatives were many and beautiful. Those of his children and grandchildren who came to follow him to his last resting place were Mr. Geo. Yearwood of Caspiana, Mrs. J. M. Brooks of Grayson, Mrs. Garrett of Atkins, Messrs. Chas. Turner and Pierce Stewart of Ringgold, Mr. and Mrs. Wilson Williams of Arcadia, Miss Willie Conger of Monroe, and Mrs. Wesley Saunders of Monroe.

## New Enterprise To Open In Arcadia In Future

Messrs. Paul Crowson and Henry James, have secured the lease on a building to be erected on the T. J. Goff lot by J. T. Harville, for a period of 15 years, and are making preparations to establish a welding shop here.

Mr. Crowson, who is a son of the late A. L. Crowson, has had 12 years of practical experience in all lines of the metal trades, and comes here prepared to render a class of service which is badly needed here.

Mr. James, is also well known here, being a son of H. J. James, formerly a resident of Arcadia. At present he is employed in Monroe in the manufacture of a new type of Oxy-Acetylene generator which has been perfected by Mr. Crowson, and which will later be manufactured in their own plant.

It is not definitely known by Messrs. Crowson & James just when they will be able to open their plant here, all depending upon how soon their building will be in readiness. They have hopes of seeing the construction work started at an early date.

There is a demand here for high class welding and other class of metal work, and the business to be established by these two young men should meet with success as it will fill a very definite need in this community.

## BUSY WEEK IN DISTRICT COURT

SEVERAL CASES DISPOSED OF DURING WEEK. OTHERS TO BE HEARD BEFORE CLOSE

District court is in session here this week, and several important cases have been disposed of, among them two murder cases. A number of civil cases have also been disposed of, either by default or judgments rendered.

On Tuesday, Fannie Fritz, charged with cutting to murder, waived arraignment and entered a plea of guilty in open court. She was sentenced to 12 months in the parish jail and to be worked on the public works of the parish.

In the case of the State vs. G. D. Bramlett, charged with murder, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. Hon. Foster R. Taylor was counsel for the defense. The jury was composed of F. M. Martin, B. F. Stall, J. A. Lee, C. W. Williams, Robt. James, Hardy E. Hamner, C. L. Wallace, C. W. Harris, J. M. Wiggins, Wallace Strong, B. P. Sullivan, and A. W. Webb, with Robt. James as foreman.

In the case of the State vs. Omar Crawford, charged with murder, by consent of the State and defense, trial which was set for Wednesday was postponed until Friday, October 27th.

## Baptist Revival To Open Next Sunday, Oct. 28

As announced in the last issue of the Democrat, a revival meeting will begin at the Arcadia Baptist church Sunday, with the morning service. Pastor J. C. Cox will conduct the preaching service, and his son, Mr. Byron Cox, will direct the song service. The co-operation of all church workers is invited, and it is hoped that everyone who can will attend every service.

## Jury Finds Fed Rambo Guilty Of Manslaughter

The case of the State vs. Fed Rambo was tried in the District Court here Wednesday, and resulted in a verdict of guilty of manslaughter, with mercy of the court.

The history of the case as well as we are able to state it is that on June 19th, 1916, following a difficulty between J. Adams and Fed Rambo, the latter shot and killed Adams. A number of efforts had been made to get a bill against Rambo, chargin him with the murder of Adams, which were unsuccessful until the meeting of the last grand jury, when Rambo was indicted for murder.

It required almost until noon to secure a jury, only one witness being examined in the morning session. The jury was composed of A. W. Webb, C. L. Wallace, Wallace Strong, P. P. Sullivan, Shelby Woodard, S. E. Lester, W. H. Hall, B. F. Stall, G. W. Williams, F. M. Martin, C. W. Harris and W. L. Huckaby.

A motion for a new trial which was presented by the attorney for the defense, was overruled.

The trial of the case of the State vs. R. L. Hancock, charged with arson, occupied the greater part of today, Thursday. After hearing the testimony of the defense and of the State, the jury retired to the jury room, and after deliberation of one hour, returned a verdict of not guilty.

A. Abraham and Grover Mobley, charged with being accessories to the arson, on the rendering of the verdict of not guilty, were discharged also, following a motion of the District Attorney to nolle pros their case.


