PROCEEDINGS OF REGULAR MEETING OF POLICE JURY

Arcadia, La., Nov. 13, 1922.

The Police Jury of Bienville Parish, Louisiana, met on this date in regular session with all members present. The body was called to order by the president and this date having been set to promulgate the returns of election ordered by resolution to be held on November 7th, 1922, in regard to Stock Law in Wards 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7, and the results will show in the proceedings of this meeting.

The minutes of the last meetings were read and stood adopted as read, with the exception of the following resolution passed at the regular meeting held on September 4th, 1922, which was not recorded:

Be it resolved by the Police Jury of Bienville parish, Louisiana, in regular session convened: That, the salary of W. C. Harrison, as guard over the prisoners being worked on public roads be increased from One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars per month, to One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) per month, and the above resolution was adopted by the following vote of the members:

Ayes—Bert Davis, J. F. Allums, W. H. Bogan and J. H. King.
Nays—J. H. Thurmond.
Absent—A. G. Whitlow.

On call for reports on roads and bridges are as follows:

The body as a whole reported roads and bridges in fairly good condition, with the exception of some repairs to be done on bridges.

On call for reports on paupers, Mr. Bogan requested that Miss Gordon, (white) be placed on paupers list at an allowance of \$3.00 per month.

Mr. Whitlow presented a petition signed by 15 citizens of ward six asking the Police Jury to place Amisic Williams and wife, (colored) on the paupers list, same was granted at an allowance of \$2.50 per month each. Mr. Whitlow also presented a petition signed by 26 citizens of ward six asking the Police Jury to place Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Vail, (white) on the paupers list. Same was laid over until the regular meeting in January, 1923.

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved by the Police Jury in regular session convened that the estimates of J. L. White on the three roads being built by W. H. Smith, Jr., and they are hereby ordered paid according to his figures, figuring the work on the one way plan and the piling in place amounting to Eighteen Thousand Fifty and 48-100 (\$18,050.48) Dollars and that the President of the Police Jury and the Treasurer be and they are hereby authorized to issue vouchers for the amounts due from the road funds of each ward in which the work is done of the basis of the one way work.

Be it further resolved that the Police Jury advance to the said W. H. Smith, Jr., the sum of Eleven Thousand and Nine Hundred Forty Nine and 52-100 (\$11,949.52) Dollars on work to be hereafter done by him on the roads and that vouchers be drawn for this amount separately from the above vouchers by the President and the Treasurer.

It is understood that W. H. Smith, Jr., accepts the payment on the one way plan under protest without in any way waiving his rights to claim pay on the two way plan and for piling in the leads, and that he will proceed with the building to completion of said roads at once.

On motion of J. H. Thurmond duly seconded, the above resolution was carried by the following vote:

Ayes—Bert Davis, J. H. Thurmond, J. F. Allums, A. G. Whitlow, and J. H. King.
Nays—W. H. Bogan.

WHEREAS, in letting the contract for the Castor-Ringgold road, to the Carr Construction Co., only

one bridge was included in the contract, it being the understanding that should there be sufficient funds to build other bridges on said roads known as the Black Lake Bridge, and the Black Lake Slough Bridge at the Mounce crossing should be built under an extension of said contract, and.

WHEREAS, the Police Jury finds that there are sufficient funds with which to build these bridges, and that it can build them at a very much lower cost by buying the material itself and hiring someone to build them, and very much cheaper than price quoted by Carr Construction Company to apply increase, said extension to their present contract is made.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Police Jury in regular session convened that the President of the Police Jury be and is hereby authorized to purchase the lumber and piling necessary to construct the two bridges above described and to enter into a contract with some responsible person to haul the lumber and piling from the railroad or such other place that it may be obtained and to put same in place at a price of exceeding Twenty-Five cents (0.25) per foot for putting the piling in place and Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per thousand for hauling and putting the lumber and decking in place.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the contractor be required to give bond with good and solvent sureties as provided by law for the faithful performance of the work of building said bridges with the material purchased by the Police Jury and the supervision of the State Highway Commission or its engineer in charge of the building of said Castor-Ringgold road and that same be completed in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by the engineer for said Highway Commission and in accordance with the rules of the State Highway Commission and the law governing such cases.

On motion duly seconded, this resolution was carried by the following vote:

Ayes—Bert Davis, J. H. Thurmond, J. F. Allums, W. H. Bogan, A. G. Whitlow, and J. H. King.
NAYS—None.

ORDINANCE

Be it resolved that an ordinance fixing the budget of expenses and receipts for the year 1923. Be and the same is hereby adopted as follows, to-wit:

Budget table with items: Salary of Parish Treasurer and Clerk, Mileage and per diem of Police Jury, Office supplies, Official printing, Sheriff's salary, Court expenses, Jurors and witnesses, District Attorney's fees, Feeding prisoners and insane, Transporting prisoners and insane, Feeding prisoners, Maintenance Courthouse and Jail, Coroners jury and expense, Parish board of health, Justices of the Peace and Constables, Election expense, Register of voters, Papers, Tick eradication, expense of inspectors and dip, Roads and bridges, Sundries.

Total expenses \$40,500.00
Estimated receipts from regular assessments \$40,500.00
Parish taxes \$40,000.00
Parish license \$500.00
Total receipts \$40,500.00

PROMULGATION

Promulgation of stock law election held in Wards 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7, Bienville parish, Louisiana on Nov. 7th, 1922.

said wards, and on canvassing the returns the results are as follows, to-wit:

Ward Two having voted 117 votes for the Stock Law and only 71 votes against, giving a majority of 46 votes in favor of the Stock Law in ward.

Ward Three having voted 79 votes for the Stock Law and 85 against the Stock Law, giving a majority of 7 votes against the Stock Law in ward.

Ward Four having voted 177 votes for the Stock Law and only 127 against, giving a majority of 50 votes in favor of the Stock Law in ward.

Ward Five having voted 63 votes for the Stock Law, and 145 against the Stock Law, giving a majority of 82 votes against the Stock Law in ward.

Ward Six having voted 61 votes for the Stock Law and 68 votes against the Stock Law, giving a majority of 7 votes against the Stock Law in ward.

Ward Seven having voted 35 votes for the Stock Law and 72 votes against the Stock Law, giving a majority of 37 votes against the Stock Law in ward.

WHEREAS, Wards Two and Four having a majority of votes for the Stock Law, as shown by the returns of the election made to this body.

BE IT RESOLVED, By the Police Jury of Bienville Parish, Louisiana, in legal session convened, that a Stock Law be declared in Wards Two and Four, and that owners of all live stock in said wards be compelled to keep same confined and not allowed to run at large in said wards, beginning on March 1st, 1923.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That any owner of live stock shall not permit their stock to run a large within the limits of Wards Two and Four, under penalty to be prescribed in such ordinance as this body may hereafter adopt, looking to the regulations and enforcements of the provisions of such election, signed in open session on this November 13th, 1922.
