

**Twenty Years a Fugitive.**

Sam Robertson has been re-nominated by the Democrats of the sixth district.

The sugar planters who joined the republicans have been called "Sugar coated Republicans," "Lilly White" and "White Sugars," but after the election they will very probably take the name of "off whites."—Ruston Leader.

Jno. T. Callahan has been sentenced by judge Moise to a term of five years in the penitentiary. It is to be sincerely hoped that the courts of New Orleans will not stop here. We are sorry for Callahan because once he was a hard working man, but made the mistake of his life when he entered politics.

Hon. Ambrose Mouton, of Vermilion parish, was nominated for Congress by the Populist Third District, mass convention, held at LeBlanc's hotel, in this city, Saturday, Sept. 29. Mr. Mouton is at present a member of the State Legislature, having been elected to that office by the Farmers' Alliance of Vermilion parish, in 1892. Since writing the above, we learn that Mr. Mouton has declined the nomination, owing to ill-health.—New Iberia Enterprise.

The New York Tribune points out the fact that five of the six candidates of the leading parties for state officers in New York are lawyers, and most of them are in early middle life. They all become prominent in local affairs at a comparatively early age. Lawyers usually have an advantage over those of other occupations in gaining early admittance to public life, but it does not often happen that so large a proportion of the candidates for important public offices are from among the ranks of members of the bar having a like history of early reputation won in the courts and public affairs.

The Times-Democrat states that the democratic campaign orators will shortly be furnished with cards which show what the consumers of woolen cloths will save by reason of the reduction in the tariff on such articles. These cards will have samples of the goods attached to them, there will be printed the tariff and the price to the consumer under the McKinley bill and the present tariff and price to the consumer. They will show, says the Times-Democrat, a saving to the consumer upon carriage cloth made of wool and cotton of 53 cents a yard; upon union Melton cloth-wool and cotton, of 46½ cents a yard; upon overcoating, wool and cotton, of \$1.16 a yard; upon worsted coatings, all wool, of 70½ to 80½ cents a yard; upon all wool cashmere of 24 cents a yard, and upon worsted dress goods of 17 cents a yard. They will show, moreover, that the operation of the new law will save to the consumers in the United States of woolen manufactured goods the tidy sum of more than \$263,000,000 a year.

Charles F. Buck, one of the most prominent lawyers in New Orleans, has accepted the Democratic nomination for Congress in the second district and will oppose Dudley Coleman. The nomination was offered to Judge Davey, but he declined it.

**GOOD NEWS ABOUT RICE.**  
Within the past few days some of the planters in this locality has received a letter from Messrs. Dan Talmage's Sons, New York. We select a portion which is of more than general interest. They state:

"The Rice growers along the Atlantic Coast received a sorry set-back in the heavy wind and rain storm of last week. By it the quality was impaired and quantity reduced. 'It is an ill wind that blows nobody any good' and the one referred to ought to redound to the benefit of the Louisiana product as the Carolina people will want all they can get for their remnant crop."

"In regard to the Rice market, would say that high average range of prices still prevails an outcome most encouraging for the producer, as all arriving parcels offered at current rates find ready sale. The crop is being forwarded just right, i. e. with deliberation, and so far as we can learn, satisfactory prices generally secured. This certainly is the way to do it and if planters are able to maintain such policy good fair values will be assured. The expected arrival of new crop has checked exports of Foreign and while they will undoubtedly continue, the volume is likely to be limited and they, therefore, not nearly so much of a competitor with home Rice as heretofore. Another encouraging feature is that the war in the East between Japan and Corea has raised prices in the far East and it would not surprise us to see them advance still further. Corea generally exports a considerable quantity of Rice but as the seat of war is located in their rice producing sections the culture has been generally abandoned and they will, therefore, have to buy from other countries, which has already had its due effect upon prices as noted. Japan, which is the Foreign style most largely used in the United States, is just now out of reach but will probably come down somewhat with the incoming of their new crop in November-December, ordinarily received here about February-March. The time we speak of is the usual harvesting period but the scarcity of labor is likely to cause delay, thus injuring quality and to some extent reducing quantity."
