Notice to Voters.
Notice is hereby given that the registration office will be opened during the months of June and July, and those who wish to register under section five of the new constitution are urged to call at the office and have their names placed upon the permanent roll. For the information of that class of voters section five, as adopted, is reproduced:
"No male person who was on Jan. 1, 1867, or any date prior thereto, entitled to vote under the constitution or statutes of any State of the United States, where he then resided, and no son or grandson of any such person not less than twenty-one years of age at the date of the adoption of this constitution, and no person of foreign birth, who shall have been naturalized prior to the 1st day of January, 1898, shall be denied the right to register and vote in this State by reason of his failure to possess the educational qualifications prescribed by this constitution; provided, he shall have resided in this State for five years next preceding the date at which he shall apply for registration, and shall have registered in accordance with the terms of this article prior to Sept. 1, 1898, and no person shall be entitled to register under this section after said date."
