

Statement About General Lee

New Orleans, Fla., Oct. 26, 1900.
The Picayune has received the following statement:
I have in hand a recently issued history entitled "The General Republic," by H. A. Guerber, and on page 55 I find the following statement made in reference to General Robert E. Lee: "He then set a good example for all his men by applying for pardon from the United States Government." Never before have I seen this statement, nor have I ever heard of General Lee's "applying for pardon," and while admiring the general fairness and impartiality of the author, I seriously doubt the truthfulness of this statement, for reasons which I will state hereafter. Would you kindly assume the questions, "Did Lee ever apply for pardon?" The old vets. here don't believe it, and I am sure such a statement, if untrue, should be authoritatively contradicted.

General Lee never asked for a pardon. He surrendered his army and himself at Appomattox, on the 9th of April, 1865, on parole, with liberty to return home and not to take up arms until duly exchanged.

General Lee lived under that provision, and, although there was talk of arresting and bringing him to trial for treason, he was never interfered with. On July 4, 1868, President Andrew Johnson issued a proclamation giving amnesty and exemption from prosecution for treason to all Confederates not already under indictment. This included General Lee. On the 25th of December, of 1868, President Johnson issued a proclamation of amnesty and pardon, which included President Davis and all other Confederates then living. General Lee never asked for pardon or any other indulgence at the hands of the Federal Government, and, until he died, held himself ready to meet any fate that his leadership of the Southern armies might bring upon him. He passed away on the 12th of October, 1870, free from any moral stain and one of the noblest and most heroic characters ever known in any age.
