### AT THE INSTITUTE.

The last entertainment to be given at the Institute will take place Saturday evening, Dec. 13, and will consist in an open meeting of the Attakapas Literary Society. This will be the first of four regular public meetings to be held annually by the society.

The Rules of Order Club is an organization of teachers and students formed for the purpose of instructing its members in parliamentary laws and usages. The enrollment continues to enlarge gradually, the one hundred fifty mark having been passed. A considerable increase is looked for at the opening of the second term in January.
