The grape crop of Claiborne was not so large as usual. The continual rains in the early spring proved to be very injurious. Not one fourth the amount of wine usually made was barreled this year.

An active, vigorous campaign is required in Claiborne parish to bring out the full strength of the Democratic party. The two primary elections have damaged us fearfully, and we very much question whether we will get anything like a strong, solid vote in November next.

QUARANTINE ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Selectmen of the town of Homer, That it shall be unlawful for any person coming from any infected place where the yellow fever prevails, to enter into or remain in the town of Homer; That no articles of merchandise or baggage shall be allowed to be brought into the town from such infected districts, except such articles as shall be admitted by order of the Board of Health established by this act.

Be it further ordained, That it shall be unlawful for any stage line or other carrier to bring into the town of Homer any person or article excluded by this ordinance.

Be it further ordained, That any citizen who has knowledge of the arrival in town of any such person or article as is prohibited by this ordinance, shall be required to report the same to the Town Marshal immediately, under the penalty as provided by this ordinance.

Be it further ordained, That the Mayor, Doctors W. W. Arbuckle, J. F. Gladney, S. R. Richardson and S. Y. Webb are hereby created a Board of Health, for the purpose of better enforcement of quarantine regulations, and that the Town Marshal be ex-officio Health Officer, to perform such duties as may be authorized and required by said Board of Health and the Mayor and Selectmen.

Be it further ordained, That any person found guilty of the violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be fined in a sum not less than Fifty nor more than One Hundred and Fifty Dollars, at the discretion of the Mayor.

Be it further ordained, That this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage; and that the same be published three times in the "Claiborne Guardian."
