A friend from ward four furnishes us with the following news items from that ward: It is still dry and the timber of the forest is dying rapidly from the effects of the long drought. About half a crop of corn and one-fourth crop of cotton has been made in this section. Whooping cough is going among the children. Mr. J. P. Moore had the misfortune to lose his little boy a few days since. The family have the sympathy of the entire community in this bereavement.

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Minutes of Monday's proceedings were read and approved.
Committee on settlement with parish treasurer reported they had received from J H Simmons, parish treasurer, certified accounts against the parish to amount of \$664.91, which they checked and burned, for which the president receipted the treasurer.

On motion, Mrs Amanda Hooks was placed on the pauper list January 1st, 1882, and \$5.00 per month appropriated for her support, to be drawn on the warrant of T W Howard.

On motion, L R Lay, J W McFarland and W S Copeland were appointed a committee to examine the tabular of 1881, prior to payment of assessor's account.

Be it enacted by the Police Jury of Claiborne parish, That from and after this date the sheriff shall be required to collect twenty-five dollars from any person or persons using the court-room for balls, shows, exhibitions, or other entertainments.

On motion, the parish treasurer was authorized to refund W F Aycock \$105.00 paid into the treasury through error.

On motion, the sheriff was required to make monthly settlements with the parish treasurer.

Be it enacted by the Police Jury of Claiborne parish, That the sheriff of said parish be and he is hereby allowed a salary of eighteen hundred dollars from April 1, 1881, to April 1, 1882, for all services officially performed by him, to be paid by the parish, both civil and criminal, waiting on District Court, Court of Appeals, Police Jury, serving road overseers' commissions, or any other official duties he may be required to perform, except collecting taxes and licenses.
