ORDINANCE. Be it enacted by the mayor and selectmen of the town of Homer, Louisiana, that the firing or discharging of fire crackers, Roman candles, or other fire works of any description, is hereby prohibited within the incorporation of the town of Homer, and any person or persons violating this ordinance by firing or discharging any fire crackers, Roman candles or other fire works within the incorporation limits of the said town of Homer, shall, upon conviction before the mayor, be fined not less than five nor more than fifty dollars, or in default of payment be imprisoned in town lock-up for not more than ten days. Provided, that this ordinance shall not deprive the mayor of the power to permit citizens of the town to discharge fire arms in cases where he may deem it necessary or expedient. WALTER WARD, Mayor. ORDINANCE. Be it enacted by the mayor and selectmen of the town of Homer, Louisiana, that a license tax for 1890 of seventy-five per cent. of the state license is hereby levied and assessed by the corporation of Homer upon all trades pursuits, occupations and callings upon which the state of Louisiana levies a license tax.
