Railroad Meeting.

Pursuant to previous announcements made in the parish papers there was a meeting of the Stockholders of the L. N. & S. R. R. held in Homer on Wednesday the 15th inst. A majority of the paid up stockholders were present and took part in the meeting. Among the stockholders were Gen. Stuart L. Woodford, general attorney of the road, and Joseph P. Howell treasurer both of New York. After a discussion of all matters pertaining to the business of the meeting, by a resolution unanimously passed it was decided to sell all the property rights and franchises belonging to the L. N. & S. company to the Louisiana & North Western Company. This latter company agrees to assume all obligations and liabilities that previously devolved on the old company. It was understood that the new company will issue certificates of stock to all parties who pay up their notes which will fall due the first of March.

The only thing unfair we see in the matter is, that the number of shares in the corporation have been increased to such a large number until the shares, of the citizens of Claiborne and Bienville who made contributions to the amount of \$40,000, have been practically absorbed. According to our understanding it cost about \$120,000 to build and equip the road from here to Gibbs. The citizens then who contributed the \$40,000 would be the equitable owners of one-third of the paid up stock in this road, for really there are but 1200 shares.

There must necessarily be some fictitious or watered stock in this company. We are told that the 3600 shares arise from the fact, that stock was issued on a basis of \$20,000 a mile, and there being 18 miles of road it would have taken \$36,000 to build it, but the facts are that not one-half of that amount was used for this purpose. Hence our conclusion that there must be some watered or fictitious stock which help constitute these 3600 shares. Then with the lights before us it looks something like the citizens will lose the \$40,000, except as to the benefits which we all derive from the railroad. Upon the whole it is a great deal better for us to lose the \$40,000 and get the benefits of the road, than to have been deprived of the road and kept our \$40,000. We have been led to make the above observations for the reason that it occurred to us that the company was not dealing altogether fair.

The new company have our best wishes and we hope they will reach Alexandria on the South and Kansas City on the North by this time next year. As they have plenty of means at their command we see no reason why they should not complete the road in this time if they so desire.

ORDINANCE. Be it enacted by the mayor and selectmen of the town of Homer, Louisiana, that the firing or discharging of fire crackers, Roman candles, or other fire works of any description, is hereby prohibited within the incorporation of the town of Homer, and any person or persons violating this ordinance by firing or discharging any fire crackers, Roman candles or other fire works within the incorporation limits of the said town of Homer, shall, upon conviction before the mayor, be fined not less than five nor more than fifty dollars, or in default of payment be imprisoned in town lock-up for not more than ten days. Provided, that this ordinance shall not deprive the mayor of the power to permit citizens of the town to discharge fire arms in cases where he may deem it necessary or expedient. WALTER WARD, Mayor.
