AN UNFORTUNATE CASE.

Mr. A. E. Wilson, who was recently interdicted, is still confined in the parish jail. We learn from a letter from Dr. Perkins, Superintendent of the Insane Asylum at Jackson, that there is not an unoccupied room nor any place in connection with the asylum where Mr. Wilson could receive treatment.

The family of the unfortunate man were writing to pay his board as well as for medical treatment, but as there is no room for him it is necessary to confine him here in the jail. The close confinement and the dismal surroundings of the jail will doubtless make him worse. If he was at a place where he could be properly cared for and at the same time receive medical treatment from some one who has had experience in treating such cases, he would very probably regain his best reason before a great while. Some arrangements must be made at the approaching session of the legislature to better accommodate the insane of our state. We certainly can enlarge the buildings so as to afford plenty of room without much additional cost, and if this was done, persons in the condition of Mr. Wilson could receive suitable treatment even if they had to pay for it.
