LOUISIANA WEATHER SERVICE.

NEW ORLEANS, April 16, 1892. The weather record for the week under consideration shows a marked deficiency in the principal characteristics: Rainfall, temperature and sunshine. The week closed with a cool wave moving westward to the middle Atlantic, and being followed by an area of low barometer which promises warmer weather for Louisiana, with light rains in the northern portion to-day and Sunday.

In the issue of the National Crop Bulletin at Washington, D. C., the first of March has been chosen as the beginning of the crop season, and departures of rainfall and temperature from the normal will be computed from that date. A review of the weather that has prevailed in Louisiana since March 1st shows anything but normal conditions. At the New Orleans station the deficiency in temperature up to last night was 121 degrees, or nearly three degrees daily, while the rainfall for the past forty six days has been 2.96 inches, as compared to a normal fall of 8.38 inches, or but little over one third the amount usually received in that time.

The temperature deficiency for the past seven days has averaged about five degrees per day, and the backward condition of all crops can be mainly traced to this cause. Some cotton was planted during the week; a very small percentage of the whole crop, however. Corn is looking yellow for want of warmth and sunshine; the stand is fairly good, and the field well worked and free from grass.

Plant cane continues very promising, though like all other crops has grown but slowly during the past week. The stubble is backward, never having recovered fully from the March frozes. In many places the rice fields have been visited by worm and bugs which have destroyed the seed to such an extent as to necessitate considerable replanting; it is not known whether these vermin have appeared generally or not.

Vegetable gardens and Irish potatoes are looking well, their principal need being rain. Reports as to fruit are more encouraging, and a fair crop is anticipated. In the strawberry districts that crop is reported as ripening slowly. The correspondent at Roseland reports no shipments to date, but crates have already been marked from Hammond, bringing excellent prices. The prospects are for a good harvest.
