TERREBONNE WINS.

In the suit of Lafourche Parish
vs. Terrebonne Parish the Supreme
Court reversed the decision of the
lower court, in favor of Terrebonne.
This suit was one to compel the
Sheriff and Tax Collector of this
parish to turn over certain moneys
collected for oyster licenses.

It was an important suit to
Terrebonne and instituted more
for the purpose of more clearly
determining the boundary lines
between the two parishes than
anything else. Had the Supreme
Court sustained the lower courts
decision a large slice of the oyster
beds that belong to this parish
would have gone to Lafourche.
The decision of the Supreme
Court in Terrebonne's favor cre-
ated much rejoicing among those
persons engaged in the oyster
business here.
