Be it known and remembered, That on this Twenty-eighth day of the month of August, A. D. 1896, we, Peter Berger, Amelie Theriot, J. Cyrille Dupont, Evellen LeBourf and Edmond McCollam, Jury Commissioners duly qualified and sworn in and for the Parish of Terrebonne, La., met at the Clerk's Office at the Court House of said Parish in the town of Houma, and in company with Anbia Bourg, clerk of the above named Court, Ex-Officio Jury Commissioner for said Parish, legally qualified and sworn as such, and then and there in the presence of Herbert W. Barton and E. Clarence Wozlow, disinterested witnesses, freeholders residing in said Parish of Terrebonne, proceeded to draw Grand and Petit Jurors for the October Term, 1896, of the aforesaid Court to be begun and holden on the first Monday in October, 1896, at the Court House of said Parish in Houma, La.

All legal requirements having been complied with and all laws relating to Jury Drawing and especially Section 5 of Act No. 99 of 1896 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, approved July 9th, 1896, we proceeded in the presence of the above named witnesses to draw from the General Venue Box containing the names of three hundred good and competent men, citizens and voters and qualified Jurors of said Parish, the names of Fifty persons to serve as Grand and Petit Jurors for the First Week of the October Term, 1896, of said Court, commencing on Monday, October 6th, 1896, the names being drawn from said General Venue Box one at a time by Peter Berger, one of the Jury Commissioners, and are as follows, to-wit:
