Jury Venire

THE STATE OF LOUISIANA
20th. Judicial District Court
Parish of Terrebonne

BE IT KNOWN AND REMEMBERED, that on this eleventh day of September in the year of OUR LORD Nineteen Hundred and Seventeen:

Pursuant to written notices, written and issued by Edwin Clarence Wurzlów, Clerk of Court in and for the Parish of Terrebonne and addressed and given to each of the Jury Commissioners in and for said Parish of Terrebonne, as appears by the said Clerk's Certificate hereto annexed, we, Volney Howard Kyle, Alcide J. Bonvillain and J. Arthur Daspit, (Leo Lirette being dead and no appointment made to fill the vacancy caused by his death) (Teles P. Blanchard being absent although duly notified to appear) Jury Commissioners duly appointed as such for the parish aforesaid, under provisions of Act No. 135 of the General Assembly of Louisiana, approved July 13th, 1898, and promulgated by publication in the State Official Journal on July 29, 1898, and all duly sworn and qualified as such Jury Commissioners in and for the Parish of Terrebonne, met in the Clerk's Office in the Courthouse in the city of Houma, and in company with Edwin Clarence Wurzlów, Clerk of said Court aforesaid, Ex-Officio Jury Commissioner, duly qualified and sworn as such and then and there at the hour of ten o'clock A. M., in the presence of Messrs Frank Fabregas and Jules Isidore Duthu, two competent and disinterested witnesses of lawful age, competent to read and write the English language, residing in the Parish of Terrebonne, and summoned by the Clerk of Court for the purpose proceeding in accordance with Section 6 of said Act No. 135 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of 1898 to examine the original Venire List in the Clerk's Office, and having struck therefrom the names of such Grand Jurors as have so served, as well as the names of others on the list who are known to have died, removed from the parish, become exempt or disqualified, were also taken from the General Venire Box; after which we supplemented the original list and the ballots in the box with the names of the same number of good and competent men from the qualified Jurors of the Parish as have been taken from the box and erased from the list so as to keep the number of names in the General Venire Box and on the Jury List at the original standard therein; each of said names so placed in the General Venire Box having been written by said Clerk on a separate slip of paper, together with the number of the ward or place of residence of such persons.

And immediately after completing said General Venire List, we selected therefrom the names of the following twenty (20) citizens good and competent men, possessing the qualifications to serve as Grand Jurors prescribed by Section 1 of said Act, taken from the different parts of the parish as far as practicable to serve as Grand Jurors at the session of Court beginning on the 1st Monday in October, and until discharged according to law, to-wit:

And having so selected the above named persons as Grand Jurors, the name of each was written on a separate slip of paper by the Clerk, in the presence of the Commissioners and witnesses, and all the slips so containing the names and number of the ward of each of said Grand Jurors were placed in an envelope by us, which was by us sealed, endorsed and labeled "List of Grand Jurors" and placed in the Jury Box as hereinafter stated.

After which, we proceeded conformably to Section 4 of said Act 135 of 1898, as amended by Act No. 58 of 1904, approved June 29, 1904, and duly promulgated, after the slips contained in the General Venire Box had been well mixed, we drew from the said General Venire Box the names of thirty persons to serve as petit Jurors for the second week of the session of said Court beginning on Monday, October 8th, 1917, as directed by an Order of Court, the names being drawn from the box one at a time by J. Arthur Daspit, one of the Jury Commissioners, in the presence of other Commissioners and of the witnesses, and which names so drawn are as follows:

After which we proceeded to draw from the said General Venire Box the names of thirty persons for the Third Week of said session of said Court beginning on Monday, October 15, 1917, as directed by said Order of Court; the names being drawn from the box one at a time by said J. Having placed the names of the foregoing thirty persons drawn as Petit Jurors for the Third Week of said session of Court in an envelope, we signed and sealed the same, and endorsed and labeled it: "List of Jurors No. 2" to serve for the Third Week of the said session.

We also proceeded in accordance with Act No. 82 of 1914 as amended by Act 122 of 1916 to select one hundred tales jurors, good men and true, and the names so selected were written each on a separate slip of paper by the Clerk, and the said tales jurors names were placed in the Tales Jury Box, kept for the purpose, and sealed and locked and delivered to the Clerk of the District Court.

And thereupon, we have placed the two sealed envelopes, together with the sealed envelope containing a List of Grand Jurors selected as hereinabove set forth in a box provided for the purpose, labelled "Jury Box," which was thereupon locked and sealed, and placed in the custody and keeping of the Clerk of Court, for use at the next ensuing session of Court and subject to the orders of the District Judge.

And the said General Venire Box was also locked and sealed and delivered to the said Clerk of Court as the custodian thereof, all in the presence of the said witnesses.

In Faith Whereof, we have signed this Process Verbal of the drawing of the Jury, made at the time, on the day, month and year first above written in the presence of the aforementioned witnesses.
