### HONORABLE DISCHARGE GIVEN JOSEPH PULLEN BECAUSE OF DEFECTIVE EYESIGHT

Mr. Joseph Pullen, Jr., has been granted an honorable discharge from the Navy, and returned to his home town, Monday of this week.

He entered the service about six months ago, and was sent to Great Lakes where he remained in training about a month; from there he was transferred to Norfolk, Va. and later assigned to the U. S. Ship Wheeling at New Orleans.

During a recent hurricane on the Atlantic, his ship came very near being sunk, but was rescued by two United States Ships. Young Pullen's discharge was due to defective vision. He spent a month in a hospital in New York and for a while he feared that he would lose the use of one of his eyes. The glare of the sea brought on the trouble. He was in the yeoman's branch of the service and had already received a promotion. His discharge is a source of great disappointment to him.

The committee appointed by the Police Jury at their meeting Feb. 28th, 1917, namely: W. T. Cobb, Dr. H. D. Larzelere and Mr. H. L. Bourgeois to take charge of the contest, (the best essay on Tick eradication) among the school children submitted their report as follows:

September 1, 1917  
To the Terrebonne Police Jury, Houma, Louisiana.

In accordance with an ordinance adopted by you several months ago, in which ordinance you appropriated the sum of eighteen dollars for the purpose of awarding cash prizes for the three best compositions submitted by pupils of this parish upon the eradication of the cattle tick, the undersigned graded papers submitted by the following students of this parish, to-wit: Misses Florence Dore, Mabel Chauvin, Madrid Ledet, Viva Hunter, Bernice Blanchard, Lucille Mackie, and Myrtle Jackson; and from Messrs. Eugene Dupont, Leon About, Harold Burton, Allie Wallis, and Andrew Jackson.

We awarded the first prize to Miss Madrid Ledet, the second prize to Misses Florence Dore and Mabel Chauvin, and the third prize to Mr. Eugene Dupont.

In view of the fact that two pupils made an even score for the second place, we recommend that an additional appropriation of five dollars be made to enable the following prizes to be awarded, to-wit: ten dollars for the first place, five dollars for each second place, and three dollars for the third place.

We desire to say that this contest was open to pupils of private and public schools and that in grading papers we considered both thought and form.

We submit herewith for your inspection all papers submitted us. We suggest that the paper winning the first prize be given to the local press for publication.

Within almost the inaccessible wilds of Nicaragua dwells a strange race, undoubtedly the only remnant of the aboriginal people who inhabited America before the coming of the Red Indian. 
