CARROLLTON CITY COUNCIL.—See proceedings of Council, at their session held on 29th May ult., in an adjoining column.

POLICE JURY.—See proceedings of the Police Jury, left bank, at their session held on Monday last, 27th ultimo, in paper of to day; also reports of officers and finance for the current term. It being the last session of the year, the labors of the body closed officially on that day.

Star Hook and Ladder Company No. 1 of the city of Carrollton, will hold their regular monthly meeting at their truck house on Madison street, between Hampson and First streets, THE EVENING, at half past 7 o'clock. A full and prompt attendance of all members is particularly requested.

Election of Police Jurors.

Monday next, Jun 3rd, 1861, the polls of the several Police Jury districts of the parish will be held, at the call of the Police Jury, at the named in each Jurisdiction, one to represent them in that body for the term of one year from the first day of July next. It is needless to do more than to remind our readers that Monday next is the day by authority of law for selecting a suitable person to fill said office for the ensuing twelve months. The River.—The Father of Waters continues to flow in full proportions, exhibiting but little change in volume for several days past, except from the effect of the winds and tides to which his majesty is subject. We have not yet passed the point where all apprehension of danger from the high water may be safely dismissed, and the continued watchfulness of our *Levee Guard* we believe to be of more than previous importance at this moment, in consequence of the many unprincipled and incendiary threats which come to us from the North. We must hold ourselves in readiness to treat all the Black Republican incendiaries of the North who attempt outrage within our borders with those special marks of attention which their actions may merit.

Messrs. CHAS. H. MOORE & Co. of Baltimore, Md., the publishers of that excellent periodical, the "Southern Family Journal," in a supplement issued on the 11th ult., use the following language in regard to present and future prospects. They say:

"To our Subscribers.—With the issue of the present supplement the publication of the *Journal* will be temporarily suspended. It is needless for us to say that we feel a deep regret in being compelled to make this announcement; but the necessities of the times leave no other course optional. With the various highways in the neighborhood of our city broken up or obstructed—with mail facilities (for periodical especially) in a measure cut off—and with the utterly disorganized condition of our political and business affairs—with all these difficulties in our path, it is, we repeat, a matter of necessity with us to discontinue our publication for at few weeks. We trust at the expiration of that time resume under better auspices than ever."

The disturbances at Newfound-land have increased. The house and stables of the Hon. Mr. Hoyle, the leader of the government, have been burned. Troops have been sent in the war steamer *Hydra* to reinforce those already at the scene of the riot.—*True Delta.*

Latest News BY TELEGRAPH,

[To the New Orleans City Papers of yesterday.]

HALIFAX, May 30.—By the arrival of the steamship *America* to-day, from Liverpool on the 18th and Queenstown on the 19th inst., we are put in possession of the following important item in regard to blockade and privateering: In a discussion relative to the blockade of Southern ports by the United States, Lord Derby said two points could only maintain a partial blockade, and that, by the law of nations, privateers could not be treated as pirates.

Occupation of Grafton.

GRAFTON, May 30.—The town of Grafton was occupied by Federal troops to-day. The Southerners retired without firing a gun.

WASHINGTON GOSSIP.

The Second New York Regiment.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—The Second New York regiment has been ordered to disband on account of its being demoralized.

Sewell's Point Impregnable.

Captain Engle reports that Sewell's Point is impregnable. There are 4000 troops stationed there, ready for the fray. Gen. Butler's plan is to surround and starve out the Southerners.

New Kentucky Military District.

A new military district called the Department of Kentucky has been formed, the command of which has been assigned to Col. Anderson.

Attack on Alexandria Expected.

A merchant in Alexandria has a letter from his brother at Richmond, urging him to leave, that the Southerners were concentrating to drive the Federalists from their post.

The Southerners are evacuating Harper's Ferry, and concentrating at Richmond and Norfolk.

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Judge Taney's Resignation.

It is rumored that Roger B. Taney has resigned his position.

Col. Anderson's Department.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Col. Anderson's Department embraces Kentucky, within 100 miles of the river.

His headquarters will be at Louisville for the present.

Illinoisians in the Southern Army.

ST. LOUIS, May 30.—Two hundred men from Illinois crossed the river at Paducah to-day, to join the Confederate States army.

More U. S. Steamers Fitting Out.

WILMINGTON, May 30.—Eleven steamers are in the act of being fitted out at the Washington, Navy Yard, with arms, ammunition, &c. They will undoubtedly sail with sealed orders.

Douglas on the Brink of Death.

CHICAGO, May 30.—Hon. S. A. Douglas, U. S. Senator from Illinois, is again sinking. Fears are entertained by his friends that he will not live through the night.

CARROLLTON COUNCIL

REGULAR MEETING.

WEDNESDAY, May 29, 1861.

Present: Hon. A. S. Ferth, Mayor; Messrs. J. Davenport, F. Schuler, F. Fischer, P. Stoulig and F. C. Zeller.

Absent: Messrs. C. Engleman, Geo. Herrle, and W. Mayo.

The minutes of May 15th and 18th were read and approved.

Treasurer Kern's report was read, showing a balance of \$34 97 cash on hand this day.

Two reports from Commissary Brunk were read, one of work done on the streets, and the other of steamboat tax collections. On motion, they were received and ordered to be filed.

Mr. Herrle appeared and took his seat.

A report was read from Surveyor Williams that he accepts and approves the work of painting the market house.

On motion, it was received and ordered filed.

A letter was received from H. Deibel in relation to his being discharged from the office of Commissary, and asking payment of his salary for balance of the term. On motion, it was received and referred to the Finance Committee.

The following report and resolutions were read, and after suspending the rules, adopted:

Hon. Mayor and Council:

Your Streets and Landings Committee respectfully report: On the call of the School Board for more room, that we have examined the premises, and find that additional rooms can be built in the rear of each of the school houses on Jefferson and Washington streets at a cost not exceeding \$ each, and as such rooms will add to the efficiency of the schools, we recommend that they be built at an early day.

On the complaint of Mr. L. Millau-

don about steamboats obstructing his mill front: That he has cause of complaint, and we think he should be relieved by the Commissary, at the same time your committee would suggest to Mr. Millaudon that the law gives this Council exclusive control of the landing, and that his consent (as intimated by him) is not at all necessary for its regulation, even in front of his own property.

Your Committee submit the following resolutions to carry out their recommendations.

Resolved, That the Surveyor is directed to make plans and specifications, after consultation with the School Board, of school rooms to be built, one in the rear of the Washington and the other in the rear of the Jefferson school houses, and submit the same at the next meeting of this Council, with an estimate of the probable cost.

Resolved, That the Commissary is directed to regulate the landing and lying up of steamboats and other vessels so as not to interfere with other boats or with the business of persons occupying the batture with the consent of the Council.

The following ordinance, offered by Mr. Stoulig, was read, and after suspending the rules, considered and adopted section by section, and then as a whole:

AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING THE REPAIR OF BANQUETTES.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the city of Carrollton, That whenever it becomes necessary to repair any of the paved or planked sidewalks of this city, made according to law, it shall be and is hereby made the duty of the Commissary to notify the owner of the property fronting such places to repair the same in such manner as he, the Commissary, shall designate in his notice, within ten days after notice, the fact and date of service of such notice shall be duly recorded in his diary, and in cases of doubt, he shall consult the Streets and Landings Committee, and follow their directions in the premises.

Be it further ordained, That whenever the front owner, notified in accordance with article I of this ordinance, shall amonies repair any of the paved or planked sidewalks in the manner and time required by the Commissary, the Mayor and Council shall and will reimburse the one-half of the cost to such owner on presentation of a bill for the amount approved by the Commissary.

Be it further ordained, That for refusing or neglecting to comply with the directions of the Commissary when duly and properly notified as aforesaid, the front owner shall be liable to a fine of \$10 for each offence, and for neglect to notify the front owners when repairs are necessary, the Commissary shall be liable to a fine of \$10 for each offence.

Mr. Zeller, in behalf of the Finance Committee, reported in favor of paying Mr. Mattle's bill of \$95 for painting and whitewashing the market house. On motion, the report was accepted, and the Mayor authorized to draw a warrant for the amount.

Mr. Mayo appeared and took his seat.

On motion, the rules were suspended for considering bills, and the Mayor was authorized to draw warrants for the following persons and amounts:

A bill of Mr. Deibel for \$20 was referred to Finance Committee. The President made some remarks in relation to the sale of the Central School House property.

A motion of Mr. Schuler, that the Finance Committee, in connection with the Mayor, be vested with full power to act in relation to the sale of the Central School House property, was carried.

A motion of Mr. Schuler, that the bills of sheriff and clerk in the suit of D. Negrotto be paid, was carried, and the Mayor was authorized to draw warrants for the amount, say \$12 25.

A motion of Mr. Fischer, that the Council Hall and Treasurer's Office be whitewashed and painted inside and outside, was carried; and on motion, the Surveyor was directed to contract for doing the work.

On motion, the Council adjourned until Wednesday, June 12th, 1860, at 5 o'clock P. M.
