LOUISIANA FOR HANCOCK.

Among the candidates for President in Louisiana Gen. Hancock has a decided advantage. A considerable movement in his favor has been organized in New Orleans, with many prominent and influential citizens as leaders. He is our first choice, and Bayard comes next. Many think Tilden should receive the nomination as a sort of vindication, but we should not allow the guile of sentiment to become a factor of certain defeat. Almost any other civilian would run better than Mr. Tilden.

ALMOST A RIOT.

A disturbance among the negroes of St. Charles parish, ten days ago, came near being a riot, but a portion of the militia was sent to the parish by Gov. Wiltz, and everything quieted down in a short time. Some of the negroes struck for higher wages, as they had a perfect right to do, provided they can get it, but the wrong they did was in trying to force all the other negroes to quit work, and in two or three instances severely beating those who were working at the old price of six bits a day. Any man has a perfect right to get all he can for his labor, but he has no right to say what another man shall work for, and it should be remembered that any attempt to do so is unlawful and will be stopped by the might of the law. Everything passed off without further trouble after the troops arrived in St. Charles, and the most of the hands are now at work.

OUR REPRESENTATIVES.

As a member of the House Major McCain has come fully up to the standard his friends expected of him, and they feel proud of the man of their choice. He has made a useful and able Representative, and is found on the side of justice and right in every emergency.

We wish also to express our appreciation of the course of Senator B. F. Brian as a member of the Legislature, and feel safe in saying that the people of this parish and district are well pleased at his actions since he became a member of that body. While we did all we could to prevent his election, we must say Mr Brian has proved himself a man for the times and in every way qualified for the position he fills. He does himself and his district great honor, and the Democrats who opposed him so bitterly begin to see that his election can scarcely be called a Democratic defeat.

Some of the papers are asking for a tax of fifty cents on every dog, while others claim that one dog should be allowed to each family, all over one to be taxed a dollar a head. We are an advocate of taxing dogs. No man that owns a dog worth anything at all will growl at paying fifty cents a year for him, and every dog should be taxed that much. In many ways dogs are useful, but in as many more they are a nuisance and positive evil. If people will have their suck-egg hounds, mangy curs, pestiferous black and tans and useless poodles, let them pay for the pleasure they take in them, and let the money go to the school fund. In every case where dogs may kill sheep or commit any other injury to bird or beast belonging to another, make the owner of the dog pay the loss and have the dog killed. In this way the country can be rid of the nuisance of useless and vicious dogs, and great help be given to educational interests.

The steamboat Marie Louise sunk in Old river on the 18th inst., while en route to New Orleans with a cargo of 1537 bales of cotton, 650 sacks cotton seed meal, 153 barrels of oil and a few sundries, on which there was the usual insurance. No lives lost, all the passengers and crew remaining on board until the Jesse K. Bell came along. It is thought the boat can be raised without injury.

Kellogg to Go at Last.

The Senate committee has declared W. P. Kellogg not entitled the seat usurped for the past three years. Judge Spofford, our duly elected Senator, will probably be seated by the 10th of April.

We learn that Judge Blackman's commission has been issued and was mailed to him last Saturday. Our information comes direct, and is from a party who saw the commission put in the mail. If the Index man wants to know what we know about the case now, we are prepared to accommodate him.

Since writing the above we have received a postal from Judge Blackman, giving the information that he has received his commission and qualified.

Sabine parish citizens are complaining of the negligence of the parish school board in holding the regular meetings, as required by law, for the distribution of the school funds provided for the education of the children. A little complaint in Grant parish at the lack of interest taken by our school board may also serve to remind them that somebody is neglecting a public duty. We have seen a check for the amount coming to Grant parish out of the State fund, and it is time some disposition was made of the money.

The material of the Carroll Conservative has been sold by its former editor and proprietor, Mr. D. L. Morgan, to Major B. H. Lanier, who is going to publish the North Louisiana Republican, a paper to be run in the interest of Grant's nomination and election
