THOMPSON WITH A "P."

Dr. A. B. Thompson, living on Little river at Lacroix's ferry, has been a bugbear to the taxpaying people of that portion of Grant parish in his vicinity for 10, these last three or four years. He is doing a mercantile business out that way, and it has been a matter of boast with him that he never pays any taxes. Of course this caused dissatisfaction among his neighbors who did pay taxes, and they had a right to complain.

Well, what we started out to say, is that Dr. Thompson (with a "P") has paid his taxes, and holds the receipt therefor. It came about in this wise: The sheriff seized his property, and rather than make a trip to Colfax he gave a draft to cover the full amount of his taxes for four years, as well as cost of seizure, amounting in all to \$121 26.

The Doctor is only one among several, and we give his case particular mention because of the notoriety it has already acquired. Taxes have to be paid now, and the time for getting around paying them has past, it is to be hoped, never to returned again, and we trust the complaint that this or that one has not paid taxes will cease. All are alike interested in good government and efficient laws; it takes money to administer the laws, and no shirkers of the burden of taxation should be allowed. Such a state of affairs, if permitted, fathers lawlessness and will end in confusion and strife.

Instructions from the Auditor.

Sheriff Teal has received the following from Auditor Jumel, which may be of interest to the citizens of this parish:

AUDITOR'S OFFICE, NEW ORLEANS, January 1, 1881.

C. H. Teal, Sheriff and ex-officio Tax Collector, Parish of Grant, La.:

Sir—In obedience to article one of the miscellaneous ordinances of the Constitution of 1879, all interest, penalties, costs, fees, and charges whatever on taxes and licenses due the State prior to January 1, 1879, and unpaid on the first day of January 1881, are revived.

You will, therefore, in collecting taxes, and selling property, in accordance with Act 107 of 1880, exact the following penalties:

Acts, 346, of 1865, p. 516, Section 62, R. S., 1866, p. 473, Section 62, R. S., 1870, Section 3311.—On all taxes due prior to the year 1869, fifty per cent damages and twenty-five per cent additional per annum, from 1869 to January 1st, 1876, and eight per cent per annum thereafter.

Act 114, 1869, p. 162, Section 80, Act 96, E. S., 1877, p. 146, Sections 53 and 62.—On all taxes due from 1869 to 1875, inclusive, twenty-five per cent per annum damages and eight per cent per annum interest, from 1st day of January, 1876, until paid.

Act 97, E. S., 1877, p. 146, Section 53 and 62.—On all taxes of the year 1876, eight per cent per annum, from Nov. 1, 1877, until paid.

Act 9, E. S., 1878, p. 241, Section 20.—On all taxes of the year 1877, two per cent per month, from December 1, 1878, until paid.

Act 9, E. S., 1878, two per cent per month interest, from December 1, 1879 until paid.

When property has been sold to the State, you will collect all costs, charges and fees whatever due at the time.

Section 66 of Act 96 extra session of 1877, page 149, requires that all property adjudicated to the State must continue to be assessed in the name of the party to whom it belonged at the date of the sale.

You will strictly comply with the instructions given in this circular. Very respectfully,
