Drawn to Serve at the Term of the District Court to be Held on the 12th Day of September, A. D. 1881.

STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF GRANT.

BE IT KNOWN AND REMEMBERED, that in obedience to an order of the honorable Judge of the 12th Judicial District Court, Parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, we the undersigned Jury Commissioners of the parish of Grant, duly appointed and qualified according to law, met this day, in the Clerk's office, in the court house, in said parish, to draw a special Jury, of Twenty-Five, to serve for the second week of the September term of District Court, for the parish of Grant, for the year 1881, which week commences on the 12th day of September next (1881) which will open on the 5th of September, 1881, for the trial of all criminal cases, when the penalty is not necessarily imprisonment at hard labor or death.

The Clerk of the Court, S. B. Shackelford, then furnished the Jury Commissioners with a list of the Jury who had served at the last term of the District Court, when the Jury Commissioners, with the assistance of the Clerk of the District Court, and ex-officio a member of the Jury Commission, proceeded to open the General Venire Box, and, after revising the same by striking from the list and taking from the box all those who had removed from the parish, died, etc., then proceeded to replace a like number of names in the General Venire Box, taken from the Registration and Poll books of said parish, so as to supplement the number of names taken from the box to its original number, Three Hundred, when Mr. E. G. Randolph drew from the General Venire Box, in the presence of the undersigned Commissioners, one at a time, the following Twenty-Five names to serve for the second week:

The above Twenty-Five names were written on separate pieces of paper, and, by the Commissioners, together with the Clerk of the Court, placed in an envelope, sealed, and endorsed on the same, "Jurors drawn for the second week of the September term of the District Court." Said envelope was then placed in the Jury Box, sealed, locked and then placed in the custody of S. B. Shackelford, Clerk of the Court, for use at the September term of the Court.

The said S. B. Shackelford, Clerk, did then and there, in our presence, keep a process verbal of all the acts done by said Commissioners in said drawing, which we hereby certify by our signatures to be correct, this 19th day of July, A. D. 1881.
