## Grant Parish Mass Meeting.

COLFAX, La., Dec. 8, 1883.

Pursuant to the call of the chairman of the Democratic executive committee of Grant parish the citizens of the parish assembled in mass meeting at the court house this day at 12 m.

The meeting was called to order and its object stated, by H. G. Goodwyn, chairman of the parish Democratic executive committee, to be for the purpose of electing delegates to the State, Judicial and Senatorial conventions.

On motion Hon. H. V. McCain was unanimously elected chairman, and H. G. Goodwyn chosen as secretary.

Nominations for delegates to the State convention being declared in order by the chairman, C. H. Teal nominated H. V. McCain and E. G. Randolph. S. M. Lacroix nominated A. G. Thompson.

J. P. Hadnot nominated C. H. Teal and Thos. Hickman.

On motion of H. G. Goodwyn it was decided to elect by ballot, and that none but known Democrats be allowed to vote in the mass meeting.

On motion of Dr. W. G. Deal it was decided that, as Grant parish is justly entitled to three delegates, by reason of 91 Democratic votes cast in ward two in 1879, which were thrown out and not promulgated by the Secretary of State, we elect three delegates to the State, Judicial and Senatorial conventions. In case this representation is not allowed, the third man to be considered an alternate.

Upon being put to a ballot the result stood as follows: McCain 75, Teal 61, Hickman 56, Randolph 22, Thompson 10, Tison 6, scattering 13. Whereupon the chairman declared H. V. McCain, C. H. Teal and Thos. Hickman as the duly elected delegates to represent Grant parish in the State nominating convention.

A. L. Grow moved to elect delegates to the Judicial district convention, and that we elect by a rising vote. A division of the question was called for, and it was decided to elect by a rising vote.

Dr. Deal nominated Dr. Dunn and S. M. Lacroix, and on motion Dr. Deal was added as the third man. A. L. Grow placed in nomination A. M. Trust, J. P. Hadnot and C. H. Teal.

Dr. Dunn moved to reconsider the vote by which it was decided to vote by rising. Reconsidered, and it was decided to vote by ballot.

The ballot being taken stood as follows: Trust 69, Teal 68, Hadnot 65, Lacroix 28, Dunn 29, Deal 28, scattering 12. Whereupon the chairman declared C. H. Teal, A. M. Trust and J. P. Hadnot as the delegates elected to represent Grant in the Judicial district convention.

C. H. Teal moved that we go into election of delegates to the Senatorial convention, and that we vote for the same by a rising vote. Carried.

J. P. Hadnot placed in nomination J. L. McCain and C. H. Teal, and on motion of J. C. Wickliffe J. P. Hadnot was added as third delegate. A. L. Grow nominated Dr. M. A. Dunn. H. Williamson nominated M. Nugent, J. H. Williams and J. A. Hargis. A rising vote was taken, resulting in 34 votes for Teal, McCain and Hadnot, 29 votes for Nugent, Williams and Hargis.

The chairman declared J. P. Hadnot, J. L. McCain and C. H. Teal as the duly elected delegates to represent Grant in the Senatorial nominating convention.

H. G. Goodwyn offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote of 51 to nothing, the opposition, declining to vote:

RESOLVED, That it is the desire of this mass meeting that our delegates to the State nominating convention cast their votes for Francis T. Nicholls, and in case he is not an available candidate that their votes be cast for Fred N. Ogden or any other good man as opposed to S. D. McEnery.

The following resolutions presented by H. G. Goodwyn were also adopted:

RESOLVED, That we heartily commend the course of Hon. N. V. McCain as a member of the Legislature.

2. That we endorse Capt. C. C. Nash, our well-known fellow-parishioner, for State Auditor, and commend him to the Democrats of the State at large as deserving of recognition at their hands for eminent services rendered the party.

3. That we endorse Judge H. L. Daigre of Rapides parish, for Attorney General, and consider him well qualified for the duties of that office.

By A. L. Grow—  
RESOLVED, That as our parish executive committee has asked an expression of sentiment from this mass meeting in relation to a primary election, we recommend that the committee order a primary election for the selection of the candidates of the Democratic party for member of the Legislature and parish officers to be voted for at the ensuing election.

Adopted by a rising vote—34 for and 16 against the resolution.

The meeting then adjourned sine die.
