Drawn to Serve at the Term of the District Court to be Held on the 5th Day of May, A. D. 1885.

STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF GRANT. Be it known and remembered that on this the ninth day of March, A. D. 1885, we the undersigned jury commissioners of the parish of Grant, duly appointed and qualified according to law, met this day, in the clerk's office, in the court house, at Colfax, parish of Grant, to draw a jury to serve at the next term of the district court, to be holden on Tuesday, the fifth day of May, 1885, being the first term of the court, and in order of his honor W. F. Blackman, Judge of the 12th judicial district, an additional jury of twenty was drawn for the second week of the May term for 1885. The clerk of the court, S. B. Shackelford, then furnished the jury commissioners with a list of the jury who had served at the last term of the district court, when the jury commissioners, with the assistance of a member of the jury commission proceeded to open the general venire box, and after retiring the same by striking from the list, and taking from the box all those who had served as jurors at the last term of the court, removed from the parish, died, etc., then proceeded to replace a like number of names in the general venire box, taken from the registration and poll books of Grant parish, so as to supplement the number of names taken from the general venire box, and to make up the number of names to twenty, one of the jury commissioners, drew from the general venire box, in the presence of the undersigned jury commissioners, one hundred and twenty names to serve for the first week of the court:
