As it may be of some interest to our parish, and especially the Farmers Union, I send you the following to show what Grant parish land will produce: I have just housed 240 bushels of corn off of 6 acres, and 212 of 4 acres. One of the 4 acres was highly cotton seeded, and yielded 72 bushels, the other 3 acres had no fertilizing. There was not corn enough put on the ground or the yield would have much greater with the same labor and fertilizing. The profit in cotton seed to the farmer is in returning them to his land, and not to sell to the oil mills. Yours, very respectfully, C. C. DUNN.
